## TREASURER'S CORNER



he Branch is in good shape financially as of the end of September. We have \$7,490 in our current account and \$11,131 in our Life Membership Fund. We are showing a profit of \$122 year to date at the end of September.

I plan to add the balance of our life

membership fees to Life Membership Fund when the GIC becomes open in February of next year. What this means is that our small profit really is a small loss on the year. I do not believe there will be any large expenses for the balance of this year.

At our AGM an increase to \$35 for the annual membership fees was approved. The need for the increase was driven by four factors: the major increase in postage rates, the weakened Canadian dollar and the low rate of return on our investments. Council has directed me to set up for the possibility of receiving dues payments via Paypal, the costs of which must be covered.

#### DR. CLUNY MACPHERSON CMG By John C. House MOM



Greenock, Scotland in 1804. The Macphersons went on to become prominent members

of the St. John's business community, and operated the former Royal Stores on Water Street. For the most part, Cluny followed a different career path, studying medicine at McGill University.

Cluny took great pride in both his Newfoundland and Scottish roots, and took particular pride in his Macpherson heritage. A supporter of the Clan Macpherson Association from its inception, he went on to serve as its honorary vice-president and as Chairman of the Canadian Branch. Although he was a remarkable man who made significant military and professional contributions during his lifetime (see November, 2010 issue of the Green Banner for a comprehensive account of his numerous accomplishments), this article will focus primarily on his legacy to the Clan Macpherson Association.

In 1915 the Germans began to employ chlorine gas against allied troops with devastat-

ing consequences. In response, the British War Office established a committee of experts tasked to identify a solution to the problem. Cluny was appointed to this group and it was he who came up with a design for a gas mask that ultimately led to the device that was utilized by allied troops, saving countless lives. In recognition of this enormous contribution, he was made a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George (CMG) in 1918.

Cluny accepted his appointment as Chairman of the Canadian pherson Association. He passed Branch in 1954, which he held until 1957. Cluny took advantage of any opportunity to promote the CMA. Shortly after the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) commenced television operations in 1952, Colonel Rivers Macpherson (the Founder of the Branch) and Cluny were given the opportunity to tell Canadian viewers about

Cluny also believed in collecting and recording folklore and family histories. In the 1963 issue of Creag Dhubh, he recounted his own personal journey to Greenock to trace his roots.4 As he pointed out, much history is lost and
