2024 Annual Gathering and AGM

The 2024 Annual Gathering was held at Newtonmore from 2nd-5th August. Despite the threat of rain, Clan Chief Jamie led the March of the Clan onto the Eilan; a highlight of the Newtonmore Highland Games. All other activities went ahead and will be reported in full in next year's Creagh Dhubh.

New Australian Branch Chairman Pam Rhemrev carried the Australian Branch sword forming part of the escort to the Chief in the March.

As has become a pleasant custom, the Clan Chattan AGM and Dinner was held on Thursday 1st August 2024 at The Kingsmills Hotel in Inverness.

<u>Australian Branch - New Office Bearers</u>. Further to the advice concerning the formal change of name of the 'NSW' Branch to the 'Australian' Branch, ALL administrative arrangements have been completed, albeit with some delays imposed by ever increasing bank security procedures.

The Special General Meeting of the 'new' Branch held on 28th February 2024 did not attract nominations from other states, however a changing of the guard saw Pam Rhemrev (Duffy ACT) elected as Chairman of the Australian Branch. The resignations of Aisla McPherson (Secretary), Adam de Totth (Treasurer), Rod

Gillespie and Ian Macpherson (Committee members) facilitated the election of John L Macpherson as Secretary after stepping aside as Chairman, Don K McPherson (Treasurer), Pat Macpherson (Registrar) and David Gillies (Committee member). Brian Bailey remains as a committee member.



Incoming Branch Chairman Pam Rhemrev (nee McPherson) (left above with John L and sister Ailsa) was born in Melbourne and later lived in rural Victoria and South Australia, where she attended Highland Dance classes. Pam's first job was in the Commonwealth Public Service; and as was usual at that time, the job lasted only until husband Bill and Pam married. Postings to the New Guinea highlands and Jakarta followed. The next posting "saw us arrive in Canberra with the first of our two children, and we have been here ever since". Pam again started work in the Commonwealth Department of Education and retired after 28 years. In the 1980s she began an interest in genealogy. Her late father (Leo McPherson, 1923-2000) also took it up and it was his energy that turned the family data into a book with photo illustrations which he called "McPherson Ancestry". Genealogy also involved Pam, unexpectedly, in being able to help an Indonesian family to clarify their connection to the Chief's line of Blairgowrie Macphersons. Pam and Bill joined the Clan Macpherson Association in 2007 and took out Life Membership in 2008. They have attended four Gatherings in Badenoch, the most recent being the 2024 Gathering.

Pat's uncle, Paul Macpherson of Clovelly, NSW has traced the family history back to a John McPherson, a mid-18th century lead miner from the area around Strontian, south of Fort William. His grandson John MacPherson emigrated to Victoria in the 1870s, and was a grazier at Branxholme, in the Western District in Victoria. Pat is looking forward to assisting in the



maintenance of our membership records and making some wonderful new friends.

Incoming Branch Treasurer Don K McPherson who lives in Whitebridge near Newcastle, NSW, has McPherson family roots in Laggan and Gairloch from where his ancestors sailed to Australia in 1854 arriving in the Shoalhaven area. Later the family settled on the northern rivers Swan Bay near Coraki where property remains in the

family. Don's father settled in Wyong after WWII and remained there until 2001. Born in 1951, at 16 years of age Don joined the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) as an apprentice. He served in Malaysia from 1975 -77, taking his discharge from the RAAF in 1980 after serving 12 years. From 1980 to 2015 (retired) lived in Newcastle and was company director of his own air conditioning company. Since 2017 Don has served as Treasurer of the Pelican Sub-Branch of the NSW Returned Services League (RSL).

In 2024, the incoming vice chairman is Derek Macpherson of Malawi. New Council officers elected at the AGM include as Secretary Joyce Cattanach (Scotland) and Treasurer Annie Le-Roy Lewis (Scotland). Officers continuing included Registrar Suzy Macpherson (England) and Webmaster Dave Muxo (Texas USA). On the nomination of the Chief, outgoing Chairman Bonnie McPherson was appointed an Honorary Vice President of the CMA Council.

as well as a Trustee and Convenor of
the Clan Macpherson Museum Trust.

Achievements of his period as Convenor included the negative impacts of Covid and the necessity of replacing the leaking roof of the Museum.

For the Genealogist - More Scottish Church Court Records.

(Courtesy Scottish Australian Heritage Council Winter 2024 Newsletter) Published by ScotlandsPeople on 25th June 2024 nearly 4,000 new volumes of records from the Church of Scotland, equating to around 290,000 digital images, have been added to the ScotlandsPeople website. This release complements the upload of kirk session minute books and accounts in 2021 and is the latest instalment in an ongoing programme of making church records available online.

This new upload, including over 3,000 kirk session records, also provides online access to records of presbyteries, synods and the

General Assembly, all of which have been made available on *ScotlandsPeople* for the first time and are ready to be explored. Covering almost 350 years of Scottish history, from the 1560s to 1900, digital images of a vast array of church court records can now be searched and viewed for free. Images can be saved at a cost of two credits per image. Available records include minute books, accounts and cash books, communion rolls, seat rents, poor relief and education records, as well as a wide variety of other records created by church courts.

Unlike other genealogical records on *ScotlandsPeople*, church court records are not indexed by name. Instead, you can browse the volumes using the Virtual Volumes search by reference number, the name of the kirk session or other court, or by place name. It is now possible to undertake a keyword search from the volume search page. Try using terms such as 'school', 'diary', or 'poor', to return matching results.

These records can help to unlock a treasure trove of information for anyone researching church, family, local or social history. Details about the lives of ordinary Scots are captured through kirk session minutes, which often document local events – weather, famine, war – and parishioners' behaviour through their notes on illegitimate births, irregular marriages, or poor relief in times of hardship. Communion rolls and seat rents unveil the names of some of the inhabitants in different parishes. School records, ministers' diaries and journals all throw light on information not found elsewhere on *ScotlandsPeople*.

For more information about these records, please see the guidance on church court records, kirk session records, and using Virtual Volumes on *ScotlandsPeople*. The article about the General Assembly sets out details about the history and the role of the supreme court of the Church of Scotland.

David J McPherson (Templestowe Vic) mounted a tent at the successful Ballarat event despite poor, very cold weather. David was assisted by local CMA members John Waddel, Peter Shine and David McPherson Junior with the set up and packing up on the Sunday.

The event had many attractions, and the Castle Venue is a great place to hold a Highland Gathering event which included; highland

dancing, massed pipe bands, a Lone Piper opening, jousting duels on horseback and traditional Scottish games. Eight Clans attended including Buchanan, Fraser, Donald, MacKinnon, Gregor, Edmonstone, MacNicol, Victorian Scottish Union and CMA. Our tent fielded enquiries from persons seeking CMA and other information. Many enquired about Clan Chattan related Clans. A number of visitors interested in the Clan Macpherson and Associated Families called in seeking information about Clan names and sought general knowledge concerning Scotland and Clan Macpherson/Clan Chattan connection.

Macpherson Places of Interest in Badenoch

Arising from a recent discussion within the Museum Advisory Committee (MAC), a question was posed concerning the upkeep of the Cluny Castle Burial Ground which is located adjacent to the southern boundary of the Castle grounds. Its upkeep has been left to the devices of local members of the Clan, who have arranged periodic maintenance. Both the CMA and the MAC are of the view that a more formal arrangement should be in place albeit at a cost, currently £150 per annum, subject to the agreement of the owners. There is some delicacy extant as neither the Museum or the Association own the Burial Ground which is located within the curtilage of Cluny Castle which was, together with its contents, sold in 1943.

Located approximately 4 miles west of Newtonmore on the A86 to Laggan, the Burial Ground contains the graves of:

Duncan of the Kiln (1748-1817) son of Cluny of the '45,

Colonel Ewen Henry Macpherson (1838-1900) second son of 'Old Cluny' and Mary Stacey,

Colonel Duncan (1833-1886) eldest son of 'Old Cluny',

Catherine Cameron (widow of Duncan of the Kiln),

Ewen Macpherson (1804-1885) eldest son of Duncan of the Kiln, Sarah Justina Davidson (wife of 'Old Cluny'),

Albert Cameron Macpherson (1854-1932) youngest son of 'Old Cluny' and Frances,

Catherine (daughter of 'Old Cluny') and Albert's sister.



Others, possibly workers on the estate, bear names on headstones including Cattanach, Grant, McBain, McDonald, McGregor and MacKay.

Recent News for 2025

The Annual Clan Chattan (CCA) AGM and Dinner will be held next year on Thursday 7th August 2025, at the Drumossie Hotel, Old Perth Road Inverness. While the first Thursday in August usually <u>precedes</u> the Clan Macpherson Gathering, occasionally the nexus is broken as the CCA AGM etc., is tied to the Moy Country Fair, next year to be held on 8/9th August 2025 at Moy Hall.

<u>Book Review.</u> The Wild Black Region: Badenoch 1750-1800; David Taylor. Reproduced by courtesy of the Clan Chattan Association magazine, March 2024.

The closing years of the 18th century have seen few studies of Highland regions like the quality of David Taylor's book Badenoch. Taylor is far from selective in his approach to the changes in the farm economy, the community and culture of this important Clan Chattan region. He looks at the effects of the new society that evolved after Culloden, concerned not about landowners, but tacksmen, subtenants and the lowest cottars as they responded to changes in community, the realities of the Badenoch environment and commercial opportunities.

He lays out the involvement (and non-involvement) of the clans in the '45 and how clansfolk suffered afterward as a result of the Hanoverian military presence. The destruction of dwellings and farm buildings and the theft of livestock that formed the economy was experienced by all, regardless of allegiance, and left the people in dire straits. Taylor's analysis of the place of tacksmen in the hierarchy before the Rebellion and changes in progress is well explained and very important to the following chapters, but he also includes commentary to regarding claims to the dutchas and the close bond of the tacksmen and their under tenants. He takes issue with other historians who expressed dim views of the tacksmen of the period. He acknowledges the rent burdens imposed on sub tenancy, and credits tacksmen with the enterprise and energy to make the necessary changes such as land improvement and cattle marketing.

The common people still operated within a subsistence farming economy that was heavily dependent on their mountain environment. He points out, that they were too quick to exploit market opportunities that came their way despite the post Culloden legislation that created intolerable pressures on clanship. Taylor argues that change, despite outside influences was proactive in Badenoch and that amid such chaos, the residues of clan society remained. The question "Who has destroyed the Gaelic people?" challenges the established trajectory of chief to landlord at the expense of an increasingly superfluous tacksman class. He drags the maligned tacksmen out of their

past ignominy and celebrates the entrepreneurial skills lacking in the profligate Duke of Gordon, the primary landowner. He strikes a comfortable balance between a crusade against landlordism and an apology for the rapacious actions and behaviour of the landowning classes. Taylor is careful to state that his book is not a study in isolation; that Badenoch was not an island, 'did not operate in a vacuum, but within a rapidly changing national dimension' and government policies aimed at 'civilising' the population. It did not experience the wholesale clearances of the Western and Northern Highland and the Isles. Later chapters encompass a half century of change covering the twenty years 1750 - and three later decades 1760s, 1770s and 1790s; a not entirely convincing approach because it seemed to set aside the natural evolution of change and he full value of events over time. Notwithstanding, Taylor's exploration of tacksmen's adjustment to changes in their roles within the clan system to within the new world of commercial farming is of great value.

The reviewer concludes, 'a rewarding and satisfying book. Future Highlands historians may have much to learn from the manner in which the author dealt with change in this singular region'. The book can be bought from Amazon.com or Abebooks.com.
