THE INTERNATIONAL GAVEL

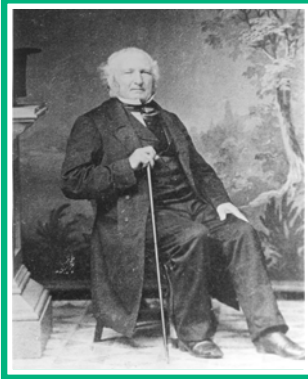
During the AGM in the Kirk Hall in Quebec City this fall, Shelagh the International Chairman, mentioned in a conversation with me she would have to get a gavel as she was impressed by the one being wielded by our Chairman. Although I couldn't commit to getting her one at that time, I did find the time later on to make her one. I asked her to accept this gift on behalf of the Canadian Branch when I sent it along. Since then Shelagh has acknowledged the Canadian gavel with pleasure.



The gavel is made of walnut in the shape of a stonemason's mallet. The sounding block is also walnut. I pointed out in my communication with Shelagh that it has eight equal sides, representing the eight branches of the CMA. The storage box is eastern white cedar and all pieces have an oiled finish. The gavel and sounding block have been waxed and the tartan lining needs no explanation.

ALLAN MACPHERSON OF NAPANEE

One of the attractions in the City of Napanee about 50 km west of Kingston Ontario, is Allan Macpherson House. The house built in 1826 is currently operated as a museum by the Lennox and Addington Historical Society. The following provides a little background on Allan and his house:

At the time that Allan Macpherson sailed for Canada from Badenoch in 1807, he was 22 years old. In 1808, Allan Macpherson arrived in Kingston, Upper Canada while his father Lieutenant Colonel Donald Macpherson, later commander of the Kingston Garrison in 1812, was still serving in Quebec under General Lowther Pennington. Allan resolved to make good fortune in the new world and brought with him a letter attesting to his good character signed by John Matheson, the minister at Laggan.

Allan Macpherson rented the Government- bought gristmill from Richard Cartwright in 1812. The mill was seven stories high, used four runs of grindstones and could manufacture flour from 1,000 bushels of wheat daily. The business career that followed was to lay the foundation for the industrial future of the village on the Napanee River.

Within a few years this enterprising young man bought the mill and built a general store at the foot of Adelphi Street. In the store he kept the first post-office and he became the first postmaster in Napanee. He soon published the first newspaper from the second level of his store. He owned and operated a distillery and sawmill near the base of the falls creating a profitable lumber business.

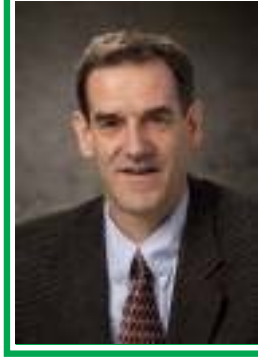
In 1818 he married Mary Fisher the daughter of a judge who was a United Empire Loyalist in Adolphustown nearby. They were married 53 years and had seven children

As well as stimulating the economy of the small village around the mill, he provided the first public building, which served as a school and church. Working with Bishop Strachan, he helped to plan the first Anglican Church built in Napanee.

Allan Macpherson was variously known as Mac, King of Napanee, or the Laird. He was influential in the politics of the time having friends in the Family Compact as the ruling clique in Upper Canada was known. Allan continued to be the centre of most activities in the community and his work was much appreciated. He died in 1875 at the age of 90.

Since joining Pratt & Whitney Bill has held many positions in the Research & Development groups and also completed the requirements for Professional Engineering Licensure at the University of Toronto. He is currently a Senior Project Engineer working on the companies large turbofan engine programs.

Bill and Irene now reside in Mississauga, Ontario and had 2 more children born in Canada, Calum and youngest son Stuart. Calum sadly passed away in 2008. Although born with a physical disability Calum lived a very full and active life bringing much joy and pride to the family and to everyone that knew him. Calum was held in such high regard that an annual award has been named after him at the College he attended.

Bill played soccer until he turned 50 and until last year was a registered referee. He still likes to jog to keep fit and in his spare time likes to carry out genealogical research. Bill is also a participant in the Macpherson DNA project.

Bill and Irene became CMA members after coming to Canada and are fortunate to have attended 3 Clan Rallies in Scotland in the last 10 years. Bill looks forward to active participation on the Canadian Branch Executive to attending with Irene many Branch and International Rallies in the future.

CLUNY RECOGNIZED AS A HERO

In the December 19 issue of *The Economist*, in the Bagehot column, the five “heros” of New Labour era were selected as outstanding contributors to governance during the past twelve and one half years. To paraphrase the criteria for selection: “...to qualify for this pantheon, a hero’s virtues must not be clouded, or be cancelled by grave mistakes or misdemeanours.”

Sir William Macpherson was noted in part “ – is Bagehot’s chosen hero. An unmetropolitan high court judge, he chaired an inquiry into the Stephen Lawrence case, in which the police bungled their investigation of the racist murder of a black teenager. ... he changed the way Britain thinks about race for the better and forever.”
