arbara Macpherson Reyelts, a long-time member of CMA, was born in Prince Albert SK and was educated at the University of Saskatchewan. She is the daughter of Jean Macpherson, former Branch Provincial Executive for Saskatchewan, and sister of Pipe Major Hugh Macpherson CD, Clan Piper. Barbara lives in Duluth MN with her husband of 40 years - Steve. She works as an executive and journalist in broadcasting and Barbara has received many awards for excellence in her field,

Barbara is well known in Duluth for her many activities in support of Scottish events there. Barbara started at age 10 as a Highland dancer, studying the art in Saskatoon and continuing on in the summers in Nova Scotia under James L MacKenzie. She started teaching highland dancing in Prince Albert when she was 12 years old. She has continued to be a successful dance teacher in Duluth with many of her students winning awards.

In addition to highland dancing, Barbara is in demand as a tenor drummer in

pipe bands in Minnesota and has won several awards in solo competitions. She also teaches drumming in Duluth.

In 2010 Barbara was honored with the Minnesota Lifetime Achievement Award from the Minnesota Tartan Day Cooperative for her efforts to keep Scottish culture flourishing through her years of service as a Highland Dancer, a Highland Dance teacher, and a participant in Bagpipe bands.

In 2011 Barbara was voted in as the newest member of the Minnesota Museum of Broadcasting Hall of Fame. The Branch is indeed proud to have Barbara as one of its illustrious and very talented members.

EWEN - A POET FOR CMA



Ather Ewan MacPherson, a long-serving life member, is an accomplished poet. This year he wrote a trilogy on the topic of Culloden, the first poem of which appears below:

CULLODEN 1

When our men fought and fell on that bleak moor, In sight of Moray Firth and Inverness, The osprey flew; caught fish and fed her young. The salmon swam the Ness and rowan trees, Their berries red as blood, swayed in the wind. The corncrakes, wide with fear, to burrow ran; And high above, in larches, squirrels hid. Pine martins, hardly seen, took guivered flight, As if they understood the evil thing, Which scarred a land that was so beautiful. Across the glens, the dreadful senseless war Destroyed a way of life the landscape made. A thousand sculptured years; we shaped the land And in this shaping, so the land shaped us, 'Till herds and crops and songs and verse and love All came together and the land a womb In which we all began our earthly life; And then the senseless slaughter killed the land; And we, our women, children lived no more. Only the ghosts, and screaming in the wind Waiting the prayers to all the Saints and Christ, Who was himself in horror crucified. Only his love could heal the ruined earth. The eagles fly above Culloden Moor. They have no sin, and yet they understand. They see a future with our life restored And we, the pilgrims, gathered round our Lord.

Now a little about our poet: Father Ewan was born in 1943 and grew up in Tiverton, Devon U.K. He graduated from the University of Toronto with degrees in English Literature, BA Hons; University College and Divinity, M. Div.; Wycliffe College. He was ordained an Anglican priest in 1979 at St. James Cathedral, Toronto. While at university he won the Norma Epstein prize for Literature (Poetry). In 2000 his book of poems, <u>The Bridge of Moonlight</u> was published with the preface written by Cluny. In 2009. Ewan was chosen Poet of the Year by the Fellowship of Christian Poets (USA).

In retirement after a stroke, Ewan now resides in Wells, Somerset UK with his wife Po Wo and they worship at Wells Cathedral. Ewan celebrates the weekday Holy Eucharist at St. Patrick's Chapel, Glastonbury Abbey and writes the 'Christian Comment' in the Wells Journal. Each year he is called upon to give recitations of poetry at the Annual Poets and Pints Evening in Westburysub-Mendip, his former parish.

COATS OF ARMS, BADGES, CRESTS, AND CMA

his is a short trip through the garden of Clan and CMA heraldry. I cannot possibly cover this extensive subject in the short space we have in the Green Banner. However there are some interesting points that may help us to diiferntiate the various terms such as crest, logo, and coat of arms that we hear from time to time and may even misuse as well. On the heraldry wall at the Clan Museum in Newtonmore for example, we find the shields of the armigers of Clan Macpherson. The shields are not the complete arms but are the principal element as we will discover.

The Arms of the Chief of Clan Macpherson



Without going into the blazon (heraldic description) or symbolism (explanations of the charges on the arms) the arms of the Chief of Clan Macpherson are registered by the Court of Lord Lyon (Scottish Heraldic Authority) as the grant of personal arms to the current Chief, Sir William of Cluny. In the heraldic

tradition, these arms will eventually be inherited by his son Jamie and then his grandson and so on through the direct line. These arms include the following principal elements; the motto, the crest, the shield and the supporters – in this case the two clansmen holding the shield.

The word "crest" has come to be used to connote badges, shields, and the complete coat of arms. In the broad public context it has also come to describe emblems of various kinds not related to heraldry like those on sports jerseys. In heraldry, the term is unambiguous and refers to the device sitting on the helm which in turn appears above the shield in the heraldic design. In this context crest simply means "top of " and relates to its position on the coat of arms. In Scottish tradition the motto appears above the crest.

<u>Clansman's Crest Badge</u>



The crest from the arms of the Chief appears in the clansman's crest badge surrounded by a strap with a buckle on which his motto is inscribed. By tradition all clansmen may use this badge on their bonnets or sporrans.

Armigerous clansmen may have

a different crest badge based on the crest in their personal grant of arms

The Arms of the CMA



In 1995, the Lord Lyon (the Chief Herald of Scotland) granted to the CMA a coat of arms, which although it is based on those of our Chief is different in many respects.

In Heraldic tradition as no two sets of armorial bearings can be identical, all Macpherson arms which are based on those of the Chief are "differenced" by the use

of variations of one or more of; charges on the shield, variations in the crest, or the use of different mottos. Interestingly, in heraldry mottos do not have to be unique but most armigers adopt different mottos than the Chief, often answering mottos containing a portion of the Chief''s motto.

The complete "achievment ' of the Association arms, as picutred above, is appropriately used to denote the CMA on such things as certificates, the CMA website and newsletters.

Badge of CMA



The badge of the CMA designed in 1947, predates the grant of arms to CMA and presents a design differenced from the clansman's crest badge. Interestingly the design is based on the Lyon Court matriculation of "old Cluny's" wilcat in 1873. It is presently employed in the design of items such as the

CMA "pin" available for the use of members and on letterhead by some branches . The crest in the Arms of CMA is based on this wildcat

Logo of the CMA



A logo is a generally a commercial device to denote the organization and may be registered as a trademark but is not synonymous with the heraldically registered coats of arms and badges of the CMA.

The present copyright logo in use by CMA contains the arms of CMA surrounded by the association name. This found principally on letterhead used within CMA and its branches although some branches still use the older badge of CMA for this purpose.
