#### THE BARD OF WOLFE'S ARMY

James Thompson, Gentleman Volunteer 1733-1830

book launch for A Bard of Wolfe's Army was held at the 78th Fraser Highlanders in Montreal. The editors of the book. Earl John Champman and LCol Ian Macpherson McCulloch CD, were present to sign copies. Many will remember lan from our Joint Rally in 2005 at Albany. Ian delighted us with many historical anecdotes while on the bus to Fort Ticonderoga.

The history of this fascinating Highlander is well researched. James Thompson kept journals throughout his life. As he was in the ranks and very literate, unusual for that time, he presents a view of life which is not often available. Ordinarily only the officers were educated and kept details of their lives. From the capture of Louisbourg to the Battle of the Plains of Abraham and the Battle of Sillery the next year it is possible to enter into these events in a way that one cannot from a history text book. John Thompson lived and worked in Quebec City until he died at age 93. His was a rich and interesting life and the book is well worth the read!

### Clan Macpherson Rally in Scotland – August 5 to 8

If you have been putting off a trip to the Rally in Scotland now is the time to make your plans for this year. As well as the fascinating time you will have at all the events and the opportunity to meet people from all over the world, you might take advantage of your trip to take a tour of the Highlands or a cruise off the Scottish coast. At my insistence we turned in our rental car and let the tour people do the driving; thus giving us both the advantage of seeing the wonderful scenery as well as having the tour guide take care of tickets, hotels, baggage, etc.

#### E. RODERICK SMITH ARMIGER

od Smith, Provincial Executive for Ontario, was granted armorial bearings on September 15 2010 through the Canadian Heraldic Authority. Gordon Macpherson developed with Rod the design and display of armorial achievements and acted as heraldic consultant and artist.

Each Coat of Arms is unique to each armiger and denotes him or her in the heraldic sense. The use of unique coats of arms started in the eleventh century when knights needed to identify themselves and their retainers on the battlefield. The arms were displayed principally on their shields and surcoats protecting their armour from the weather. Hence the origin of the term "coat of arms". Today the grant of arms is an honour within the Canadian honours

system.



The lymphad or galley is taken from the Cluny Arms and the castle signifies descent from the Macleods through the maternal line. It also recognizes the armiger's career in engineering and building restoration. The Anvil a blacksmith's tool, refers to his surname.

The wildcat Crest, a common symbol of the Clan Macpherson, is seated upon a mural coronet, representing the armiger's membership as a Guardian of the Clan Macpherson. The mural coronet is charged with a red Trillium to indicate the family's long residence in Ontario as well as representing Mr. Smith's service to the Scouting movement. The wildcat is holding a Torch to honour the educational accomplishments of the armiger and the other members of his family.

The motto is an answering motto to that of the Chief's "Touch not the cat but a glove", one of the finest features of Scots Heraldry.

Rod can be proud of this addition to his family history granted by the Governor General of Canada under authority of the Queen and found in the Public Register Vol. 5, p. 555. Our congratulations are due to Rod and also to Gordon for another excellent piece of heraldic art.
