
ANNUAL DUES

BOOK REVIEW – BEHIND ENEMY LINES

thlete, soldier, businessman, Tommy

Macpherson excelled at them all. In spite of suffering from a crippling childhood disease, taking inspiration from his older Tommy brothers became a first rate player in many sports leading to being a contender the 1948 Olympic team as a miler. The last of seven children and as he suspected, an afterthought, Tommy was dispatched to boarding school where he was a

good student showing early leadership in sports and in the school Officers Training Program. This led to his commission in the Cameron Highlanders at the outbreak of World War II.

When he had an opportunity to join the Scottish unit of the Commandos, an elite special service force, he went with enthusiasm seeing his first action against the Vichy French in North Africa. He was taken prisoner and eventually escaped returning to service when he volunteered to serve with the Jedburgh units. These were specially formed to work behind the German lines in Normandy to encourage the French Resistance to interdict German logistics and slow re-enforcements to the Normandy beachhead. This he accomplished with élan ending up with three Military Crosses, three Croix de Guerres from France, and other recognition of his military accomplishments.

After the war he entered Oxford where he studied politics, philosophy, and economics, selected so studies wouldn't interfere with his athletic activities. On graduation he eventually joined the firm of William Mallinson, a significant wood and timber processer. He rose to become Managing Director of the firm and expanded its business worldwide through acquisitions and adopting diverse products. On leaving this company, he moved into the world of finance and served on several boards. He was elected President of the European Chamber of Commerce where he made significant contributions. Through his military connections he became adviser to several defence ministers in the UK. He was recognized for this service with a knighthood becoming Sir Thomas Macpherson of Balivil.

The book is a good read. In keeping with his reticence to discuss his wartime experiences, like many combat veterans, Tommy leaves the reader feeling there is more to this story that could be told. Tommy is much more proud of his athletic accomplishments than anything else. Although the title is <u>Behind Enemy Lines</u>, it is really the story of a remarkable life with an extremely gripping military interlude.

HERALDRY IN THE US BRANCH

uring the US Branch Rally in Wichita in September there were various seminars offered for those who were not taking the external excursion. As the weather was a little threatening I decided to take in a seminar on Heraldry being offered by Richard Barnes. Richard is a Macpherson through his great-grandmother's side and has been a member of CMA since 1982. He developed an early interest in heraldry following in the footsteps of his father who had a similar fascination.

To a Canadian who was granted armorial bearings in the right of the Queen, an American cousin having a strong interest in this subject is remarkable as US citizens do not have access to a grant of individual arms in their country. US Citizens can inherit arms in direct line from antecedents who were granted armorial bearings in Scotland or other countries having a heraldic authority. Some US members have done just that in the past. If this connection is lacking, heraldry is an academic or artistic pursuit.

I found Richard's presentation interesting and accurate. It was developed to show to visitors at the Macpherson tent at games in Utah where Richard resides. The objective of his presentation is to educate those interested in Macpherson heraldry and possibly with a broader interest in the subject. His work shows a deep devotion to the topic well beyond that to simply make his presentations. He is also a budding heraldic artist and has developed a concept for his own arms, which he would request if he is able to find some way to matriculate in Scotland, a project on which he is working.

MY CONNECTION WITH ROBERT BURNS SCOTLAND'S NATIONAL BARD

he poems and songs of Robert Burns are an integral part of the school curriculum in Scotland and from a very young age I became an avid fan of his work. Coming from a working family background, I was inspired that the Ayrshire Ploughman, held in as high esteem among Scots as William Wallace and Robert the Bruce, could aspire to become Scotland's National Poet.

Over the years I have committed several of the bard's works to memory, the most recent being what I consider to be one of the finest narrative poems ever written, 'Tam O'Shanter'.

The characters Burns created in this epic tale were all based on his personal acquaintances. These include Tam the hard working and hard drinking chapman billy (peddler fellow) at the market in Ayr (Auld Ayr, wham ne'er a toon surpasses, For honest men and bonnie lassies) and Souter Johnnie. The Souter (Shoemaker) was styled on John Davidson renowned for his wit and jest and a family friend whom Burns regularly visited.

Excerpt from Tam O'Shanter:

But to our tale:— Ae market-night,
Tam had got planted unco right;
Fast by an ingle, bleezing finely,
Wi' reaming swats, that drank divinely
And at his elbow, Souter Johnny,
His ancient, trusty, drouthy crony;
Tam lo'ed him like a vera brither—
They had been fou for weeks thegither!
The night drave on wi' sangs and clatter
And ay the ale was growing better:
The landlady and Tam grew gracious,
wi' favours secret,sweet and precious
The Souter tauld his queerest stories;
The landlord's laugh was ready chorus




Old print showing Tam O'Shanter centre, with Souter Johnnie at his left elbow

Genealogy is another of my pastimes and having reached a dead end (if you will pardon the pun) on the Macpherson side I recently decided to venture down my father's maternal side. To my great delight I found out that I am a first cousin 8 times removed of Souter Johnnie.

The chart on the right shows my relationship. However it is difficult to show one in the Green Banner that is completely readable, so I will describe a simplified version of my relationship to help the reader:

Starting with Andrew Davidson in 1673, who had two sons. John and Bryce. Bryce's son John, born in 1728 was Souter Johnnie, the shoemaker. The other son, John Davidson's line continued down to Mary born in 1818 who married Thomas McBurnie born in 1843. The McBurnie line passed down to Amelia, my Grandmother who was born in 1891. Amelia married my grandfather Thomas Macpherson who was born in 1883 and died in1958. My father Thomas was born in and passed away in 1970 leaving



me related to Souter Johnnie through my Davidson forbearers.

In 2007 when I was in Scotland for the CMA International Gathering I made a visit to Kirkoswald a small village in Ayrshire to see Souter Johnnie's Cottage (which is currently under the care of the National Trust for Scotland) and the auld church graveyard .

BRUCE GILLIS OC



ruce Gillis, our new Provincial Councillor, for Nova Scotia, was born in Saint John, New Brunswick. He grew up in London, Ontario, and the Annapolis Valley Nova Scotia. Bruce graduated in science from McGill University, Dalhousie for law, and the London School of Economics for a Master of Laws. He considers himself primarily a Nova Scotian, where he now enjoys a small but

extremely busy rural law practice. He has the honour to be a Queen's Counsel (QC)

Bruce joined the CMA after a trip to Scotland in 1984, encouraged by Wallace Macpherson a former, now late, Chair of the Canadian Branch. A couple of years later he attended his first Clan rally at Newtonmore and Kingussie, in company with his mother Mary and his brothers. He has been keen on the Clan Macpherson Association ever since.

Bruce and Debbie, also a member, currently live in Paradise NS in a very large house consisting of a modest 23 rooms, on 250 acres of agricultural and woodland. They used to raise saddle horses and Bruce competed in Western Riding competitions for many years but has now slowed down that activity a bit, although they still have four horses they ride for pleasure. Bruce is involved in lots of other activities, including being Drum Sergeant in the Pipe band at Greenwood Air Force Base, so he has travelled quite a bit with them to Tattoos and the like.

Bruce and Debby have two grown up sons, and one daughter, who have all been to Clan rallies in Scotland and attended oth-

er functions. The children are keen on these activities, but at this point they have trouble finding time to be regular attendees.

Bruce is an armiger of Clan Macpherson as he was granted a coat of arms by the Canadian Heraldic Authority in 1993. His shield is on display at the Clan Museum, thanks to Gordon Macpherson.

Bruce hopes to be able to increase the number of CMA members in the Maritimes and get more clansmen involved in Clan activities.
