ast year at the AGM in Scotland, the CMA Facebook page was officially approved by CMA Council. Input from key members around the world helped to make this happen, under the direction of our past Canadian Chairman, Mark Macpherson.

Those of you who are not internet savvy, at least not members of Facebook, Twitter, or other prominent social network platform, may not know that Facebook was started by two Harvard students as a way to communicate to each other. This social network grew to be international in scope, extending its reach from Harvard, to all post secondary schools, and then eventually to anyone in the world with a computer, tablet, or mobile phone.

Our page now has over 334 "Likes" from visitors who elect to click on the "Like" button. We also have numerous "posts" from visitors who want to leave a message and/or photo. Think of this as a free subscription to a magazine. These subscriptions stem from UK, Europe, South Asia, Australian and New Zealand, Africa, the Americas, and most recently South Sudan! We expect that the CMA Facebook page will attract new members. Several people in the Americas and Australia have indicated interest. DUBLIN MARATHON—A PERSONAL JOURNEY

y father's family is Scottish. My mother's family is a mix of Irish, Dutch and French: Irish predominantly. My mother has 137 first cousins in Ireland. I had met one, Ann. Last Christmas I was trying to decide (in equal parts) which marathon to run next, and where to spend my next vacation. Ireland has been on my list because I have family there that I've never met. The Dublin Marathon was scheduled for October 31 2011. Not my first choice of vacation season, but I was hooked. I signed up for the marathon December 28th, 2010.

Ready to run

My grandmother, Margaret

McLaughlin, was born 1906 in County Tyrone, near Plumbridge. As a Canadian, I have all of the romantic visions of my ancestry. So, with the help of Facebook, the internet, and my mother's youngest sister who had been to Ireland, I booked a 17 day vacation: 7 days in Northern Ireland, 6 days in Dublin, and 3 in London.

Jamie, my 15 year old daughter, and I took off for Ireland. My marathon was 8 days into my vacation. The plan was to visit the North in the first week, run the marathon, then visit Dublin, and finish with a few days in London (my fav city so far).

I ran a practice 9k in Derry. The river Foyle is paved for pedestrians and bicyclists alike. And one can run both sides of the river. I laughed when one woman was huddled in her coat and scarf walking across the bridge, saw me run up the bridge and down the bridge. She thought it was cold and that I was crazy. Derry is amazing. It's the only walled city left in Ireland. And it's wonderful.

Belfast is wonderful. I loved the city. Hate the politics. Jamie and I took the Black Cab tour of the "political" tour. A wonderful tour, and as a Canadian, I think our tour guide gave us a bit more. My tour of Belfast concluded with a run along the river Lagan in Belfast. This was by far the best run I have

ever run! I was in the city but I felt like I was in the country and it was so beautiful. I regret that I didn't bring my camera.

October 31, 16 degrees, rain. The race was hard. I had been told Dublin was flat. And please note that I hate running hills. The entire first half of the marathon was up hill. Some steep, but most a slow 10 degree uphill run. I was hoping for a 4:10 time, but 5 miles in I doubted I could run any good time. So I prepared myself for a dismal run, and just set out to enjoy it, rain and all.

Unlike Toronto, there were hundreds of thousands of people cheering the runners on. No car horns were heard at intersections. Everyone was happy to see the runners and cheered us on.

I finished, in a torrential downpour, with a personal best time. I beat my last time by just over 2 minutes. Not what I was hoping for, but quite acceptable.

We all have in us a passion; a desire to succeed; a will to do the best, to conquer, to beat the odds. Running is a mind game as much as a physical game. I decided to beat my last time. And I came up the energy to do so. We can all find that energy in our lives. We are Scots. We are Macphersons. With that same desire, we will conquer, succeed and beat all odds.

My next run is a ½ marathon in Burlington, Ontario. Here's hoping for no snow, no wind, and reasonable temperatures. Maybe a Scotland marathon is in my future?

MACPHERSON ART & ARTISTS

special exhibition on 'Macpherson Art & Artists' will be staged in the Clan Museum this coming season. Wide publicity will be given to the fact that all of the paintings on public display have undergone conservation treatment in recent years.

A display of '21st Century Macpherson Artists' will include Gordon Macpherson of Burlington, Ontario who is renowned for his heraldic art. Also of particular interest to Canadian visitors will be a display on the work of Margaret Campbell Macpherson (1860-1931) of St. John's, Newfoundland, thanks to the kindness of Ian C. Macpherson of St. John's. The portrait of Dr. Cluny Macpherson (1879-1960), also of St. John's and the nephew of Margaret Campbell, is on display and was the subject of conservation treatment

thanks to the financial support of the Canadian Branch of the CMA. Another Canadian to feature will be Duncan Macpherson (1924-1993), the distinguished political cartoonist of the Toronto Star. This display is being supported by Duncan's widow, Dorothy, of Beaverton, Ontario, the Toronto Star, his fellow cartoonists and others.

The principal display includes the portrait of Eliza Gordon Macpherson of Cluny (1785/86-1863) found in Cluny Castle ten years ago having suffered serious fire damage. The full story regarding Eliza and her husband, Lt. Gen. Robert Barclay Macpherson, will be the subject of an article in the next issue of *Creag Dhubh* by Dr Alan G. Macpherson of Newfoundland, who also helped with the cost of restoring the portrait.

The exhibition will also include Robert Turnbull Macpherson (1814-1872) the foremost photographer of Rome, Giuseppe Macpherson (1726-1779) Florentine miniaturist, Douglas Macpherson (1871-1952) artist at the opening of the tomb of King Tutankhamun, Emma Macpherson of Blairgowrie (1833-1916) Australian Pioneer, A&J Macpherson, 19th century lithographers of Edinburgh and 'Four Generations of Macpherson Artists'.

All clansmen and clanswomen visiting the Clan gathering this summer in Scotland will have an additional reason to drop in to our museum for a visit and see this fine exhibit.

EWAN A. MACPHERSON PhD



wan A. Macpherson, Branch Webmaster, was raised in St. John's, Newfoundland, where his parents Professors Alan G. and Joyce Macpherson still reside.

Following an interest in acoustics and sound perception, he attended Queen's University for undergraduate studies in Engineering Physics, the University of Waterloo for Master's studies in Physics, and the University of Wisconsin, where he completed his Ph.D. in experimental psychology in 1998. He was a researcher at the University of Michigan until 2009, when he re-

turned to Canada to take up a faculty position at the University of Western Ontario. There, he is an instructor and researcher at the National Centre for Audiology.

Ewan has played the pipes since childhood, and had the honour of piping at the Scottish Clan Rally in 1980 and 1996, for the US Branch contingent in the Tartan Day Parade in New York City in 2004, and at the Canadian/US joint gathering in 2005. He also organized and arranged the pipe music for the Jubilee Rally in 2006. He is one of the official Clan Pipers, and has had several commissioned tunes published in Creag Dhubh. He was the Pipe Major of the Ann Arbor Pipes and Drums from 2001-2005 and has participated in solo competitions at the Grade I level, including an invitation to the prestigious Nicol-Brown contest in 2004.

Ewan was a member of the US CMA branch for many years during his time in the States, and is now a life member of the Canadian branch. Inspired by his father's life-long contributions to the Association, Ewan is happy to be able to contribute as Piper, Creag Dhubh Editorial Committee member, and now Canadian Branch Webmaster.

Ewan is married to Nancy Davis, a clinical psychologist in London, Ontario. They have two children, Jessica (5) and Aaron (3), who both have a keen interest in piping and drumming.
