TREASURER'S CORNER



Our very successful gathering in Kingston is now over and all expenses have been paid. So; it is now time to look at our finances and reflect upon what has transpired this past ten months. We have grown our life members fund from \$4,300 to over \$9,900. Our current account shows an operating loss of \$654 which can be attributed to the transfer of previously held life membership money to the GIC's of the life members fund. The Association net worth has increased from \$12,750 to over \$17,700 which includes the \$3,200 bequest from the estate of Carol Macpherson. Which means the actual operating profit is over \$2,000 for this year. The Clan Association is in a very strong financial position and I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their support.

Having said that; I would remind our annual members that **membership renewals are due January 1**, so why not renew now and avoid the rush?

OUR ADVENTURE IN HISTORY

After a year of planning by our Vice Chair, Bill Macpherson, and trips to Kingston to wrap up details, the 63rd Annual Gathering assembled for a memorable weekend in September. There is much Canadian history about Kingston and incidentally, much Clan history as well. Bill saw to it that we were immersed in both.

The view from the Radisson hotel was superb, offering the Kingston harbour, three Martello towers, the Royal Military College, and Old Fort Henry. About 40 Members assembled at the hotel on Friday evening for a “Meet and Greet” buffet followed by a mini-ceilidh. Mary Margaret Gillies and Dana Fitton swung into action with a history quiz in which each table of eight participated as a team to answer Clan history questions. We were joined by Cluny and Hilary who took a very active part in the proceedings. This was fortunate as Cluny, along with our Gordon Macpherson, figured in some of the questions being asked.

We also were pleased to see Bill and Jan Macpherson from Scotland representing the Scotland Branch and the CMA Executive respectively. Providing able representation from the US Branch was Ken Croker, its Chair, and Carolyn. The cei-

lidh continued with a pictorial report from Ed Smith on his visit to the Gathering in Badenoch this year, which everyone found fascinating indeed. Ed played a leading role in the sing song that replaced the “traditional” choir this year. All present did their best, led by Ed, to master the words and music from the song sheets provided by Mary Margaret. We had a presentation by Lisa Bird and Carson Murphy from the Lennox and Addington Historical Society based in Napanee to the west of Kingston, on some Macpherson historical facts in the Kingston area. Following the active part of the Ceilidh, most of us retired early in order to catch the important meetings scheduled for Saturday morning.

Your Council met early Saturday morning to have a working session before the general meeting. Important topics such as strategies for finding and recruiting new members, security of

Mid- morning, about 30 members joined the assembly for the Annual General Meeting to hear the reports of the officers, and others serving on the Council. Gordon, as Chair of the Nominating Committee, presented the nominations for the 2013 Council, which were then elected by acclamation. The AGM was conducted with due dispatch by our able Chairman in time to visit Cluny’s “Cage” in the hotel for a libation before lunch and the boat trip scheduled for the afternoon.

VISIT TO CLUNY HOUSE

One of the highlights of our trip for this year's Canadian Branch Gathering was a visit to Cluny House (built circa 1817) by Lt.-Col. Donald Macpherson Commander of the garrison at Kingston during the war of 1812.

Thanks to an article by our Editor in the June 2010 edition of The Green Banner, I was aware of the Macpherson-Kingston connection. Advertisements placed in two local newspapers in an attempt to attract cousins to our gathering successfully achieved that aim, and in addition brought in some very interesting contacts.

First Lisa Bird & Carson Murphy, volunteers at Alan Macpherson House in Napanee (Alan was Donald's eldest son), contacted me and kindly came along to our Friday night Meet & Greet Buffet to make a presentation giving some background and history for our enjoyment. Then I heard from Laurie Macpherson Keefe and her husband Barry. Laurie is a Great-Great-Great-Granddaughter of Donald. Her children are the 7th generation of the family to reside in Kingston. Unfortunately they were going out of town on the weekend of the Gathering and were unable to join us. Finally I heard from Anne Croy and husband Carl, current owners of Cluny House, who graciously offered our members a tour of the house and grounds.

At the end of the war of 1812, Lt.-Col. Macpherson spent some time as Commanding Officer of the 10th Regiment in Quebec City. On retiring from the military, he returned to Kingston and had Cluny House built in Pittsburgh Township just off the old road from Kingston near Fort Henry. Anne and Carl gave us a most informative tour and shared many interesting facts on the house and its features. The house is built using local limestone blocks and whilst it has been modernised and extended retains most the original character and features. Anne pointed out 3 granite bricks that had been built into one of the walls, Legend has it Donald included them to depict the 3 distinct branches of Clan Macpherson.

Another piece of interesting information is that the house was once owned by The Honourable Dr. George F.G. Stanley who was one of the designers of the present Canadian Flag. Ann showed us the room in which it was designed and shared

with us her collection of background information, which included copies of the original concept drawings.

As the visit ended, Cluny thanked our hosts for a wonderful afternoon and presented Anne & Carl with a signed copy of our clan history, *The Posterity of the Three Brethren*, plus the Green Banner issue that included the article on Donald.

MY ARMORIAL BEARINGS

On the 15th May 2012 my petition for arms was granted by the Canadian Heraldic Authority and recorded in Volume VI page 138 of the Public Register of Arms, Flags & Badges. My sincere thanks go to our very own heraldic expert, Gordon Macpherson, for his patience and wise council in guiding me through the process, for his excel-

lent artwork, for his ability to convert a few of my ideas and then combine them with his heraldic creativity on my personal arms.

My Shield: The colours, the saltire division and cross evoke Scotland the land of my birth. The winged cog wheel combines the wings and cogwheel from the arms of Mississauga, my city of residence and represent my profession as an engineer in the aerospace industry. The galley, cross crosslet and hand with dagger come from Cluny's arms and affirm my allegiance to him and Clan Macpherson.

The Crest: The wildcat is traditionally associated with Macpherson arms and the garland of maple leaves and shamrocks respectively reflect my allegiance to Canada and to my branch of the Macpherson family traced back to Ireland in the early 1800s.

Mottoes: As the first of my known direct family members to have armorial bearings I chose to have two mottoes. The first in traditional Scottish style placed above the shield and crest, DARE NOT TOUCH THE UNGLOVED CAT is an answering call to the Chiefs motto. The second placed below the shield, COURAGE PEACE STEWARDSHIP emphasizes personal values associated with the given names of my immediate family members. Etymologically, the names William & Andrew (my eldest son) mean courage, Irene (my wife) and Calum (my deceased son) peace and Stuart (my youngest son), stewardship.

I am so very proud that my armorial shield, painted by Gordon, is already been on display on the heraldic wall of the Museum in Newtonmore. My thanks go to Gordon for this kind gesture.

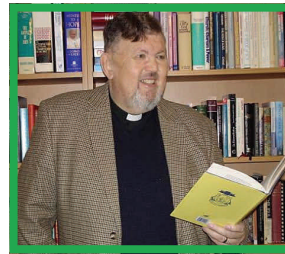

COMMEMORATING THE DIAMOND JUBILEE



Father Ewan MacPherson our poet residing in the town of Wells in the UK, submitted a poem he wrote in honour of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. A copy of it went to HM The Queen at Buckingham Palace. Later, along with the folded card of royal photographs that all well wishers received, came a letter from the Queen's Lady in Waiting, which said that the Queen had read the 'touching' poem and had liked it very much.

The poem was read in Canada at the Royal Mohawk Chapel, to which Queen Anne gave a silver Communion set in the eighteenth century. The Chapel is in Brantford, Ontario. The poem was read by a fellow student at Wycliffe College, University of Toronto, now Bishop Mark MacDonald, whose grandmother has Ojibway blood. Bishop MacDonald has responsibility for all the Anglican indigenous people in Canada.

O, what a thing it is to wear a crown;
To bear the burden lightly, with such grace
That we, whether in countryside or town,
Are strangely stirred by your anointed face.
You came among us as you said you would
To live your life in service of us all,
