There were 57 pipe bands competing in the North American Pipe Band Championships, eight of which were American bands. Later during the closing ceremonies it was announced that one of the pipers from London Ontario had passed away shortly after his band's competitive performance. There was a minute of silence for him just before the massed bands comprising a total of 1472 musicians marched onto the field which brought a huge thunderous response from the crowd that couldn't drown out the sound of the pipes.

The Clan exhibit was staffed by Bob & Marlene assisted by their grandchildren, spelled off by Mark and June. Our provincial councillor for Quebec Myles and his wife Linda, arrived from Montreal around 2pm and were able to help out. Mark and June tried the "Beavertails" on sale at an outdoor food concession beside the Clan building. One of these is more than a lunch for two and tasted OK – but calorific!

We had a fair number of inquiries from passers-by who discovered they had a Clan connection but we were unable to close a deal with any of them at this time. Bob's triplet grandchildren were fascinated by Mark's deafness and spoke right into his hearing aids asking many questions about this affliction and how it came to be. At the end of the day Mark, and June, Myles, and Linda headed back toward Montreal for dinner after an interesting and delightful day. Bob, Marlene, and family stayed overnight to watch the massed bands, visit with friends and enjoy the fireworks display.

THE HIGHLANDS OF DURHAM GAMES 2013

n Saturday July 27 Marlene and I went to Uxbridge ON and set up the tent in Elgin Park for the Highlands of Durham Games. It was cloudy and cool with threatening rain but the rain held off until late in the day just about the time we usually pack up.

I was busy during the opening ceremonies alone on the field with the other Clan representatives. There was a flurry of activity at the clan tents shortly after the ceremonies but soon the traffic dwindled to a trickle. There was some interest in our display and what we had to offer, but not a dime changed hands by the time the rain started falling. At this point we packed up and headed home.

MACPHERSONS IN WORLD WAR I REVISITED



A s a follow-up to the article in the March edition of The Green Banner on "Macphersons in World War I", I am pleased to report that Canada will be well represented in the largest ever special exhibition in the Clan Museum next season. The

exhibition will have artefacts galore, stories of bravery and extreme sadness, and many pictures to illustrate the action that members of the Clan Macpherson played – many making the supreme sacrifice.

A special Book of Remembrance has been produced, sponsored by the Australian Branch of the Clan Association and with the title page designed and produced by Gordon Macpherson, Niagara Herald Extraordinary. Casualties are included from Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, South Africa, United Kingdom, United States of America and the West Indies. A total of 499 of the name Macpherson fell in the Great War, with 79 of them serving under the Canadian flag

Pictures and information of family members have been received and these together with others who have been identified, will feature in the exhibition including:

Captain John Ross Macpherson, DSO and three of his brothers from Orangeville, Ontario enlisted as Privates and were subsequently commissioned. John Ross was killed in action on 26th August 1918 at the capture of Monchy-le Preux in Arras and a brother, Angus Willson, composed the music for *In Flanders Field* in his memory.

Private Joseph Christie Clunie, the maternal grandfather of Bob Archibald, former Chairman of the Canadian Branch, was wounded in action at the Battle of Amiens in August 1918. A Christmas card sent by Joseph in 1916 to his family from the Front will be on display.

There are others such as Dr. Cluny Macpherson of St. John's, Newfoundland, the inventor of the first working gas mask. It is hoped to have a replica of his gas mask.

Col. Ernest Ronald Rivers-Macpherson, who was born in Jamaica, served in the UK army and moved to Ottawa in 1947. He was given the charter to establish a Canadian Branch of the newly formed Clan Macpherson Association and in this he is described as indefatigable.

We were highly successful in researching Lance Corporal Somerville Macpherson, MM, who was killed in action whilst serving with the 47th Battalion, Canadian Infantry, and whose medals are on display in the Clan Museum, which revealed that he was born in Edinburgh and was the brother of Major James Ewan (JE) Macpherson, former clan historian, editor of *Creag Dhubh* and Vice President of the Clan Association. Out of the 499 Macphersons who lost their lives, only two of them were women. One was Nursing Sister Agnes McPherson from the Lakeland area of Alberta. She will feature prominently in an article in next year's *Creag Dhubh*.

The exhibition is now at the planning stage and although it will be available for visitors to view from the beginning of next season, consideration is being given to having an official opening on Monday 4th August 2014, exactly 100 years to the day when Great Britain declared war. This is also the Monday of the 2014 Clan Gathering when it is hoped than many clan members will be present.

COME FLY WITH US - EAST TO WEST THE MOCKFORD WEDDING

The wedding cake featured a professional sculptured Norseman (CF-LZO) airplane cake topper. The Noordyn Norseman was a successful Canadian bush aircraft originally introduced in 1935 and built up to 1959. Dennis owns and flies aircraft CF-LZO which he purchased to participate in the 100th year of flight.

Macpherson tartan was in evidence in the sash on Edie's wedding dress representing her Clan connection through her mother Beth MacPherson, with the Cape Breton tartan on the table coverings alluding to Edie's maritime birthplace in Sydney NS.

The reason for the aviation theme was that both Edie and Dennis have Canadian Forces backgrounds which were followed by employment with Westjet as a baggage agent and Air Canada as a pilot respectively. Both are now retired.

This was a memorable wedding for both bride and groom who received many best wishes, including from CMA. Edie tells us "It was a hoot!"





A PAGE FROM THE PAST

historic and memorable highlight of the 65 year history of the Branch was the first visit of Cluny and Lady Cluny to the Canadian Branch to attend the Scottish World Festival at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto as Guests of Honour. The Festival, held on Saturday the 19th August, 1972, was an unqualified success

and the Chief and Lady Cluny captivated the hearts of all the Canadian clansfolk and Canadians who were present n general.

Cluny and Lady Cluny arrived at the stadium in an open, horsedrawn carriage with an impressive escort of Toronto mounted policemen. They were met by our son Sandy Macpherson, age 15 at the time, who carrying the Chief's personal banner, escorted the couple to the Royal Box, where they were joined by J. Donald our Chairman, and his wife Betty. Who will ever forget the colourful tattoo which followed with Cluny acknowledging the "Salute to the Chief" performed by the massed pipe bands before a capacity crowd of over 35,000.



The following day we held a small, informal gathering for tea at the home of Mrs. Alex Macpherson and then, on Monday evening, our 23rd AGM & Rally was held at the Lord Simcoe Hotel in Toronto with over 190 clans-

men present to honour the Chief, the largest number ever to attend a Macpherson gathering in North America. At the conclusion of the brief business meeting, Lloyd MacPherson, a former Chairman, who had organized this event, presented the Chief with his personal banner bearing his Coat of Arms. The banner was made especially for the occasion of Cluny's visit to the Scottish World Festival and presented to him on behalf of the members of the North American Branch. After an entertaining programme, the evening concluded by the singing of Auld Lang Syne.

As we all said "au revoir" to the Chief and Lady Cluny, the pipes played "Will ye no come back again", expressing the sentiments of all the North American clansfolk.

The Rally was followed the next day by a visit to Niagara Falls by the Chief and Lady Cluny and then back to Lloyd MacPherson's home near Aurora, Ontario where a number of clansmen gathered for an informal evening. Then on to Ottawa, where the Hon. Mr. Justice Alex Cattanach gave our distinguished guests a personally conducted tour of the Canadian Courts before they travelled to Montreal to return home to Scotland.

REMINISCING FROM SCOTLAND

n 23rd August 1947 the Clan Macpherson Association was officially formed, one of the founding members being my father, Allan Grant Macpherson from Inverness. There were four branches in Scotland (north, south, east & west), and three branches in New Zealand (Invercargill, Christchurch & Auckland).

Two years later, the Canadian branch was formed; however people from the US also joined, so it was re-designated the North American branch until 1974, when it was divided and the US branch was born.

The north of Scotland branch was run by my parents, based in Inverness and I thought I would share some of my memories with you. In the 1950s, fund raising was totally different from today. There was no such thing as e-bay, internet or sponsorship in those days. Britain was still hurting from World War II and money was scarce; however one fun way of raising money was to hold an annual jumble sale, the equivalent of a yard sale today.

Once the clothes and other items were sorted and priced, the doors would open and the queue of people would rush to the tables in a race to purchase the best of the goods. As children, my sisters and I would help, and although hard work for the adults, we thought it was great fun.

The proceeds from the jumble sales helped fund outings to places of interest to the Clan Macpherson. Buses would be hired, the size of which would be determined by the numbers attending. We would all pile in, carrying our own picnics. Games would be played, we would paddle in a nearby loch and, if there was a piper present, reels would be danced in the heather. Occasionally there would be a Sunday outing with a church service held before the picnic. Whole families would

participate in these events.

The adults also attended highland balls, and I remember watching my parents, my father resplendent in his 'dress' kilt & sporran, the silver buttons shining on his evening

jacket and my mother's ball gown

sparkling, her 'dress' sash over her shoulder. My sisters and I were allowed to 'look, but not touch' before they left for the evening. Incidentally my father inherited his sporran from his father and this year my son Euan wore it to the ball. The sporran is now 100 years old and still in excellent condition!



In 1963 my father became Chairman of the Association and my sisters and I were enrolled as life members. As youngsters, we attended the annual rally (now called the gathering) and it was held in the Duke of Gordon Hotel, Kingussie as it still is today. There was a

much more relaxed approach to events in the sixties. There were no health & safety issues, fire regulations, number restrictions, etc.

The Macpherson clan gathered and took over the hotel for the weekend, where everyone stayed, most knowing the owner personally. It was not a problem if the party continued into the wee sma' hours, and it was unsurprising to find the late Hugh Macpherson from Edinburgh piping in my parents' room at 3am!

How things have changed since the early days!

Today there are branches in 7 countries, each one holding their own events and Gatherings including an AGM. Membership has reached over 2600, proving we are indeed a global organisation. Jumble sales don't exist anymore and branch events reflect modern day living and the culture of the member country, for example: Scottish branch outings include visiting whisky distilleries, theatres, museums and playing curling matches, in addition to the annual barbeque and Burns Supper.

There is one constant though. When I became Association chairman in 2009, I followed in my father's footsteps and the ethos that applied to my father, also applied to me. Those involved with the Association are as keen and enthusiastic as ever and the camaraderie and hospitality extends worldwide. Whether it is being a member for over 50 years or being a new 'recruit' the feeling of belonging to a huge family remains the same; to me it is still as much fun as it was all those years ago.
