

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

or a week this August I traveled with my daughter Erin up to Whitehorse in the Yukon as a volunteer with Habitat for Humanity. We were engaged for week building a house for Habitat Yukon, a local branch of the national organization that builds affordable hous-

ing for people of modest means.

The Habitat team, made up of faculty, staff, and alumni from the University of Waterloo, led by Erin and her colleague Michelle Burlock, kept busy with various construction tasks. I spent most of the week installing siding and the railings for the deck on a house. Less experienced volunteers are typically paired as "apprentices" with those having more experience in construction. My "apprentice" was Ralon Nazareth from Rennison College, University of Waterloo

Habitat operates nationwide and involves municipal, regional,

and provincial governments, developers, suppliers, and volunteers, to put together housing for people who might not otherwise be able to buy at market price. Habitat started over 30 years ago in Manitoba and has spread across Canada and the US. Erin has worked as an Assistant Registrar at the University for several years and was involved with the Habitat team from her office for most of that time. She has travelled to Europe and Central America on several fly-in builds as they are called. The Yukon trip was the first fly-in build opportunity to take place within Canada, so Erin and associates wanted to be part of it.

When not working at the site, the Habitat team, eleven in all, toured a number of local attractions including the Tahkini Hot Springs, a game preserve, and local museums. One museum included an impressive display of woolly mammoths and other creatures found in the Yukon, uncovered as a result of the mining industry. In some of the local history museums it was apparent that many members of Clan Macpherson played a part in the development of the Yukon as evident from the proliferation of our Clan names to be found throughout the territory.

A WALK IN BADENOCH

t the Gathering in Badenoch this summer on Monday August 4th, several clan folk left the Duke of Gordon Hotel for a three mile walk to Lynchat, north east of Kingussie. We walked along the Gynach burn which flows through Kingussie into the Spey, passed by a sub-

division, a large stand of pines, the golf course, several farms, fields of heather, ridges with terrific views, a small burn with stepping stones for crossing and finally into a pasture that held an ancient cave, or souterrain, from the French for underground.

Known locally as "Raitts Cave" it dates to the later Iron Age (around AD 100-400). It is a stone built underground structure with two chambers, in a crescent shape. It was discovered and first excavated in 1835. It is said to be built along the lines of Maes Howe, an ancient Neolithic chambered tomb in the Orkneys. Raitts Cave has large stone slabs forming the roof and the entire structure is covered with earth. I was probably used originally for storing food between hunts and harvests.

There are several local legends regarding this cave but the one related to me during this walk describes a slaughter of members of the Clan McNiven over some grazing rights. Apparently the Clan Macpherson had some cattle seized by the McNivens for allowing their cattle to graze on McNiven lands. The Macphersons sent the chief's daughter to retrieve these cattle, which she did, but returned with her petticoats missing and the bull's tongue had been cut out. A fierce battle ensued and the McNivens received the short end of the stick and those that were not killed sought refuge here in these caves.

A short time later their hiding place was discovered and the Macphersons returned to kill the remaining McNivens.

The rest of the walk was all downhill and filled with the sound of the pipes. A piper living in the area had chosen to practice his piping when we were on our walk which made for a pleasant experience. A horse also came across a field on a hot trot to greet us as we passed by. I guess we had been the only exciting thing that had happened in the neighbourhood that day.

At this point it was only a short distance to the place where we had initially parked our vehicles and a short drive to Kingussie to have lunch, thus ending the walk.

John Macpherson CMA Chair, brought greetings from Cluny who regretted that he was unable to attend. Donna, who is co-convener on the US side with Jacqueline Murdoch for the 2015 Joint Canadian-US Gathering, gave a plug for this event that occurs every five years.

The reports from the members of Council indicate that the Branch was in good financial shape and was progressing slowly toward increasing the membership in spite of losses due to attrition and deaths last year. A vote of thanks was rendered to Bob and Marlene Archibald for continuing to represent the Branch and the Clan at Highland Games in Ontario last year. It was noted that for the first time in many years that our Honorary Chairman, Gordon Macpherson was unable to attend the Gathering. We hope that things will work out for him and Nancy for next year at Chicago. Following adjournment of the meeting, members repaired to the hospitality suite for a libation prior to lunch and the visit to the Canadian War Museum.

The current Canadian War Museum opened in 2000 and covers all facets of Canada's military past and includes over 2500 objects from art, artifacts, vehicles, to audio-visual displays and hands-on activities. The tour organized for the Gathering was a perfect tie from our Anglo-Scottish roots to our Canadian present.

The tour, attended by 19 members, was organized and hosted by a wonderful veteran, Robbie Robertson, who is a friend of Clan Piper Hugh. It began at the headstone for the Unknown Soldier, which is directly illuminated by the sun each Remembrance Day, and continued through the Museum. Mr Robertson worked hard for about two months to bring to the CMA a private and specially scripted tour highlighting the achievements, actions and accomplishments of Scotts serving in the Canadian Forces including Canadians of Scottish descent and Macphersons serving in the military from the Kings Royal Regiment in the 1700's right up to modern wars and conflicts.

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A FORTNIGHT AT THE MUSEUM

o you remember the "Night at the Museum" movie? The exhibits came alive after the Museum closed, Teddy Roosevelt rode his horse up and down the halls, the Easter Island Moai talked, and the Albert Einstein Bobble

Heads became famous!

I'm a songwriter, and I believe in miracles, magic, and moments. Our Macpherson history is full of this kind of stuff, and you can find it at the Museum!

Read on for the fortnight of history: ancient, current, and newly-in-the-making! Many of my Scots friends told me old tales, spelled out words, and patiently demonstrated the concepts and stories so that I could pass them clearly on to you. It is my hope that you will get interested, come alive, and visit the Muse-

um when you join us next year at the 2015 CMA Gathering in Scotland!. You will find some examples below:

A story told by Mary and Norman McPherson from Aberdeen has it that Malvine, daughter of James Macpherson of Ossian fame, was walking in the purple heather when she received the sad news that her true love was killed in battle. She began crying, and grieving so piteously, that when her tears reached the purple heather, they turned the heather white. To this day 'tis a special thing to find a patch of white heather amongst the purple. White heather is always provided to each registrant at the Gathering in Scotland.

A story of the sgian dhubh (pronounced skee-en-doo) and translated as the "black knife" was related to me by Norman: In the old days this short knife was normally hidden from view (black) and carried in the armpit under the armor plate so a man could quickly pull it out cross-body and throw it to bring down the prey. The prey could be either food or enemy. The Scots are known for their hospitality so if invited to stay at a house, one knew he would be safe. It was a show of good faith to take out the sgian dhubh and put in a visible place such as the top of the hose.

We have the mysterious oil painting of Eliza Gordon Macpherson who was born in 1785 in Canada. The artist, Sir John Watson Gordon, painted it circa 1820. In 2000, the painting was discovered in Cluny Castle in poor condition, where it had languished undiscovered for over 100 years. It was given to the Museum and the canvas was restored to its original beauty in 2011.

There is the interesting account of Duncan of the Kiln, 19th Chief who was born in around 1747, in a kiln not far from the blackened ruins of Cluny House, the only son of Ewen and Janet of Cluny of the '45. His military service extended for 30 years. At the age of 17, he held a commission of captain in the British Army. In 1775, he accepted a commission in the 71st Regiment Foot of (Fraser's Highlanders)

and fought for the British in the American War of Independence. He distinguished himself in the Battle of Boston Creek as commander of its 1st battalion.

Here is some new history: There was a "Name the Wildcat in the Drumochter Room" contest during the Ceilidh at the Gathering this year. Some of the names suggested were; Moggy, Hamish, Mr. Squish, Catriona, and a few naughty ones that we cannot mention here. I am happy to report that the winning name of the wildcat was CLUNY!




