EGYPT - THE LAND OF THE PHARAOHS

Ila and I have wanted to visit Egypt for many years. Things finally looked calm and we decided to book our trip.

We flew to Cairo to start our Egyptian adventure. Because we had combined two tours together we had our first day as a free day. What to do with a free day? We decided to walk to the Egyptian

Museum, which was reasonably close to our hotel. The walk was pleasant and we had no uneasy feelings. The most dangerous part of the walk was crossing the roads.

We spent the whole morning and half the afternoon wandering throughout the museum. This museum houses the treasures recovered from the tombs of the pharaohs. King Tutankhamun's (King Tut to his friends) tomb is the most complete. King Tut ruled for a relatively short period of time and had no major campaigns or battles. Yet, his tomb was filled with many very valuable artifacts and his death mask was made of 22.6 pounds of gold. The king's mummy was in the sarcophagus which was inside 3 gold covered boxes each slightly larger than each other. The museum was almost worth the trip by itself, but we were just getting started.

The next morning we started our tour with a trip to the old capital, Memphis. In Memphis we saw the colossal statue of Rameses II and the alabaster Sphinx. From Memphis we travelled on to Sakkara where we saw several step pyramids—the largest being that of Djoser I, dating from 2686 BC. Also at Sakkara we saw the walled funerary complex associated with Djoser's tomb / pyramid. It was all very impressive but we were still waiting to see the pyramids at Giza, which was our next stop.

The pyramids at Giza did not disappoint. The largest and most impressive is the pyramid of Cheops (or Khufu) and close to it is the pyramid of Chephren (or Khafre) who was Cheops son. It is smaller but positioned higher on the plain to make it appear taller. Tradition would not allow him to build a greater structure than his father, thus the move to higher ground. There is a total of six true pyramids at Giza with a number of much smaller structures, called queen's pyramids in the area. I went into one of the smaller true pyramids down to the burial

chamber. I was surprised at how warm it was even though I was about 50 metres below ground.

Part of the Giza complex is the Great Sphinx. The head of the sphinx is thought to be a likeness of Khafre with the body of a lion and the tail of a cobra. The sphinx was created to "clean up" the area. The stones for the pyramids were quarried from this area and the body of the sphinx was a large unquarried rock in the middle of the plain.

Our next day started with a visit to the Citadel, which overlooks the city of Cairo and was originally built by Salah El-Din, of crusader fame, in the twelfth century. The complex was expanded by Mahammad Ali and the Alabaster Mosque added. We left the Citadel and headed for the Egyptian Museum. We had visited the museum on our first day but with a guide to describe what we were seeing, it added a whole new level of understanding.

The next morning we flew from Cairo to Aswan and on to Abu Simbel. Because of luggage problems we missed our flight from Aswan to Abu Simbel. The next (and last flight of the day) had only 2 seats available and our group was 4. Our tour director solved the problem of who stays and who goes by taking the passports of the 2 ladies, holding them behind his back and asking one of the ladies to choose a hand. Ella chose his right hand and we went to get our boarding passes for the next flight. The tour director then went and hired a car and drove the other couple from Aswan to Abu Simbel.

When the other couple arrived at our lake boat, we went to see the temples of Rameses II and Nefertari (his wife). These temples were originally located 65 metres down the mountain, but the flooding that would be caused by the Aswan high dam would have covered them. The temples were surrounded by a coffer dam and then carefully cut into 20 tonne blocks on average. A dome was created on top of the mountain that resembled the rest of the mountain and the temples were reassembled. The project took 4 years, 1964 to 1968, and cost 40 million dollars, or 300 million dollars in today's dollars.

The temples were truly something to behold in terms of both size and decoration. Because of the later arrival we stayed at the site and waited for the light show to begin. It was not a long wait as Abu Simbel is located just north of the Tropic of Cancer. The light show was wonderful, very informative and entertaining.

The next morning we started our cruise down Lake Nasser to Aswan. The boat cruise was very relaxing and we stopped at various sites that had been moved to prevent flood damage from the Aswan High Dam. There was some very impressive engineering work done to relocate the buildings and the artwork on their walls.

On our first day of cruising we passed the Citadel of Kasr Ibrim. It was once a formidable city high above the Nile River, but today it appears as an Island due to the construction of the Aswan High Dam.

Later that day we reached Amada where we viewed the amazing temple built by Thutmose III. We also walked to the Temple Derr built by Rameses II.

Walking a little farther we reached the rock carver tomb of Penout. Penout was once a Viceroy of Nubia during the reign of Ramesses VI. It was getting dark as we left the site and at the temple of Derr the generator had run out of fuel and the temple was in darkness.

Early the next morning we cruised to Wadi El Seboua, an area also known as the Valley of Lions. The temple at Wadi El Seboua was restored by Rameses II and is entered by walking up a boulevard lined by sphinx. A very impressive entrance. The temple Amun was added by Rameses II to mark his jubilee

celebrations which were about 30 years into his reign. One of the guests on our tour remarked that if you were asked to name who the statue was, and if you said Rameses II you had a good chance of being correct. Rameses II became Pharaoh of Egypt when he was 24 and died when he was 94. He was a vigorous campaigner with many victories

After exploring the temple we walked up the causeway to the Temple of Dakka which was probably built by a Nubian King to honor Thoth about 220 BC.

As the Roman Empire expanded it became a fortress protecting the southern border. We left and moved on to the Temple Maharraqua which features a winding staircase to the roof. There is no other structure in Egypt of this period that has this feature.

We boarded our boat and cruised on to the Aswan High Dam. But before disembarking we went to visit the Temple of Kalabsha. The temple was built by the Romans about 30 BC as a

tribute to the sun god. The same site has the Kiosk of Kertassi and the Temple of Beit El Wali both built by, you guessed it, Rameses II.

This ended our lake cruise but we continued on with a cruise down the Nile to Luxor.

THE MACPHERSON DNA PROJECT

In August 2006, Professor Alan G. Macpherson PhD from Newfoundland, Canada proposed to the leaders of the Clan Macpherson Association (CMA) to commence a DNA project to verify the various clan histories and genealogies through Y- Chromosome testing. The Macpherson Project Group was launched in March 2007 at Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) out of Houston, Texas. Professor Macpherson published his first results of the DNA project's testing in the clan association's annual Creag Dhubh No.61 in 2009.

As of this writing we have grown to nearly 300 members. FTDNA now offers tests for YDNA, Mtdna, Family Finder and the BigY which is now our ultimate DNA test. The YDNA and BigY tests are for the paternal lines. We recommend our new male members start with a Y67 test for the best results, although they can begin with a Y37 test. YDNA tests the DNA passed down from father to son.

The Mtdna is used by women or men who wish to trace their mother's line as it traces the X- Chromosome, which both men and women carry. As a genealogical note, remember female surnames change from generation to generation.

FTDNA's Family Finder test is the test for autosomal DNA. Family Finder is a very popular and inexpensive test, which will show 4-6 generations of cousins. This is a test for both men and women. Many of our male members like to purchase the Family Finder test along with a YDNA test. This provides maximum benefit for research of DNA and genealogy.
