
The second gift is the Vance Family Bible printed in 1886 listing the births and deaths of their family. Pictures are posted on the next page.






This is Joseph and Margaret's family Bible. Such a treasure!









Remarks by Cluny on the occasion of the Opening of the Macpherson Museum, Friday 5th August 2022

Friends, Cousins:

Today's event has been billed as a 'formal re-opening' of the Clan Macpherson Museum and in a few minutes I am going to invite you all to do just that - to raise your glasses to the prosperity of our Museum as together we open the latest chapter in the Museum's illustrious history.

Opened in 1952 by my wife's Grandmother, the Clan Macpherson Museum was unique even then, the first ever clan museum in existence in the country, if not the world. In just two rooms it housed artefacts rescued from Cluny Castle following the sale of the estates in 1943, a small collection of treasures of massive importance and significance to those who bear the name Macpherson and to the wider community.

Since those early days, the Museum has enjoyed two extensions and most recently it has benefitted from a new roof. In 2007, the Museum was awarded Visit Scotland's four-star rating, an accolade we have proudly retained to this day.

Over the years, the collection has expanded with acquisitions and further donations and over time the manner in which the collection has been presented has also changed, whether in reality or virtually. One of our exciting innovations some years ago was the development of the Electronic Museum, taking artefacts to those never fortunate to visit the Museum in person wherever they might be across the world. We intend to build on this in the future with a new and interactive website, harnessing the best to match our ambitions.

In its most recent carnation, emerging from Covid 19 quarantine like a butterfly, the Museum now abounds with colour and light, a series of interconnected galleries taking the visitor through different chapters of our history, familiar and traditional themes wonderfully presented to capture the imagination, inform and delight.

Not only that, we now have a theatre area, a dedicated space for children and an expanded shopping area which will particularly focus on the work of local artists.

We also have a new Curator, Aila, under whose leadership the Museum is setting out to forge new and lasting relationships across the local and wider communities, and building a network of volunteers to help run and manage the Museum. Since her arrival in April, it has been wonderful to hear her recount the tales of new visitors to the Museum, some of whom have not darkened our doorstep in years.

Many of your will be familiar with the *Talks from the Museum* series which are being broadcast across the internet monthly throughout the year and of the programme of events taking place this Autumn that are designed to highlight aspects of our collection and to entice to the Museum new visitors of all age groups, including children from the local schools. Out-of-season events are also being developed including a Christmas Special!

As Macphersons, we are all immensely proud to be part of the history of this wonderful part of Scotland and hope that our historic and contemporary links to Badenoch will be strengthened through all that we do in and around the Museum.

Spanning the last seventy years, countless numbers of people have been and are involved in creating and maintaining the Museum we have today: funding bodies and government agencies from whom we have received grants, Friends and Guardians of the Museum, generous visitors, people from afar who have raised money for us, office bearers and committee members. And not just Macphersons - members of the local community and people much further afield.

I could mention numerous people by name but will not on this occasion - there are just too many and it would be invidious to single out a few: this Museum is their Museum and to them all we owe an enormous debt of gratitude.

If you have not volunteered to support the Museum in some way, I would like to encourage you to do so. I am proud to say that I'm now involved in developing the Museum shop and have high expectations of my children too!

In Ewen MacPherson's newly published and highly recommended book, *The Clan Macpherson: Trials, Triumphs & Treasures*, reference is made to the Museum as a Jewel in the Crown of Scotland. As all those who visit the Museum this weekend and in the future will testify, our crown has just got even brighter!



Clansmen and women, the people of Badenoch present here today, friends and supporters of the Museum - some not present and yet others no longer with us, as your Chief, I invite you all to raise a glass to those that had the foresight to set up the Museum 70 years ago and those, donors, public agencies and contributors of time, energy and imagination, who have enabled it to reach this, the next stage of its development - Newtonmore's Clan Macpherson Museum, reborn and reinvigorated, a Jewel in the Crown of Scotland: the Museum.



## Flowers of the Forest



Dr. Joyce Constance Macpherson

Born 26 June, 1929, in London, England to Wilfrid Brown and Agnes Brown (née Hurry), passed away in the company of family on 19 July 2022 in London, Ontario. She was 93 years old. She was predeceased by her husband Dr. Alan G. Macpherson (1927-2018) and is survived by her son Ewan Macpherson (Nancy Davis) and grandchildren Jessica and Aaron, of London; and her daughter Anne Macpherson (Jamie Spiller) and granddaughters Aelis and Tamsin, of Rochester NY. Joyce was the first in her family to attend high school and university. When Britain democratized access to higher education in the 1940s Joyce walked determinedly through that door, transforming her life through her studies, and passing on that opportunity to her children and students. She was a proud graduate of Ware Grammar School, Hertfordshire (1947), Bedford College, University of London (B.Sc. 1950), King's College, University of London (M.Sc. 1956), and McGill University (Ph.D. 1966). She taught high school geography in England 1951-1957, was a research assistant and lecturer at McGill 1959-64, was a member of Memorial University of Newfoundland's Department of Geography 1966-94, and became Professor Emerita in 1998. She was elected Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society in 1992, and was awarded the RCGS Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002.

A geomorphologist and palynologist, her research on post-glacial climate warming and vegetation change particularly across Newfoundland has contributed to our understanding of the past 10,000 years. She took great pleasure in fieldwork trips across Newfoundland with students to extract sediment cores from ponds and bogs, from which she isolated ancient pollen grains distinct to each plant species, spending hours counting them at her microscope. Among her many publications was The Natural Environment of Newfoundland, Past and Present (1981), co-edited with Alan. She established the Joyce C. Macpherson Graduate Research Award in Physical Geography as an annual award in the MUN Department of Geography. A pioneering woman in her disciplines, she persisted against sexism, valued progressive male mentors and colleagues, and welcomed more women into the field. Joyce loved plants, the outdoors, travel, baking, music, and books. She conjured berries, rhubarb, vegetables and flowers from her St. John's garden, shared the bounty with friends including Susan McCorquodale, filled her home with plants, and shared gardening joys and woes with neighbours the Andersons and the Shawyers. In retirement she was active in the MUN Oxen Pond Botanical Garden's Friends of the Garden, serving as FOG president in 2003-04. Juggling career and motherhood, she organized family hikes all over the Avalon Peninsula, and in retirement walked many happy miles in Iceland, Britain, Australia, Belize, and across Canada. As she grew frail with age and dementia she continued to collect leaves and conifer cones and to tend her houseplants. The loving enriching childhood she provided her children included the example of community service, to the Children's Centre, Academics for Nuclear Disarmament, and the Eastern Newfoundland Regional science fair among others. Her family takes comfort in the rich legacy she leaves to her academic community and her family, and in her lifetime of generous concern for, and correspondence with, relatives, friends, and students alike, from Newfoundland to Norway to New Zealand. Her family is deeply grateful to the staff of the Manor Village at London and of the Palliative Care Outreach Team for the skilled and compassionate care they provided in her final months and days. In accordance with Joyce's wishes, her remains have been begueathed to Western University's School of Medicine; a celebration of her life will take place at a later date.
