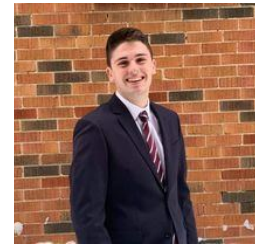
Carol's interests include photography, cycling, gardening and yard work, family history and anything else that strikes her fancy at the moment.

Donald Murray Macpherson

Angus "Elder" McPherson of Kingussie, Badenoch, Inverness-shire Scotland, emigrated to Canada with his entire family in the summer of 1844. The family settled on what is now Lot 24 of the Gore of Puslinch. The eldest son Donald purchased what became the family farm where I now reside on Macphersons Lane. My 3 brothers (John, Ken and Bob) and I were raised on this dairy farm.

Donald's working life was spent in various scientific and engineering occupations. My final jobs were in the area of software development and design.

Douglas Murray Macpherson was born in Perth, Scotland, youngest son of James Anderson Macpherson and Margaret Macpherson October 1944. Doug married Una Bryson Robertson and emigrated to Canada in July 1965. Securing a job at Stelco in Hamilton he joined the United Steelworkers Union and became active in union affairs'. Working his way through many positions until elected President of local 5328 in 1982. In 1985 Doug was appointed to a union staff position in Peel

Halton, Ontario, becoming area coordinator in 1987, he was appointed to assistant to the Director of District 6 of the USW. Retiring in 2010 from the USW Canadian National office in Toronto, Doug continues to serve the retired union members in both the United States and Canada as the Vice President and Canadian Coordinator for the Steelworkers Organization of Active Retirees (SOAR)

Doug lives in Burlington Ontario, Una, his wife of 57 years died, May 8,

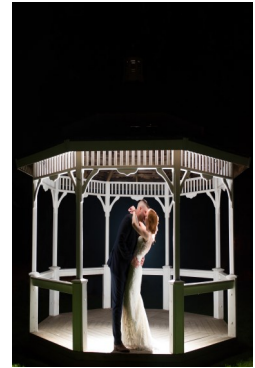

MacPherson DNA Project

For those who do not know, along with being involved in our Clan Association as the Ontario West Councilor, I also am actively involved in the Family Tree DNA project as one of the co-admins. My journey into the world of genealogy started approximately 20 years ago now. I suppose I am what you may call an early starter as I began researching my family tree when I started University. Since this time, I have built a substantial tree on ancestry along with testing DNA on 23andme, ancestry and family tree DNA. In June 2021, the admin for the Macpherson DNA project, Beth Frost approached me to see if I may consider taking on a co-admin role. It has been a very rewarding experience thus far. For those who do not know, Family tree DNA hosts family DNA projects, the Mac/McPhersons being one of them. To date, we have over 600 members along with a social media presence with over 1 700 members world-wide. Although the backbone of our DNA project is male y – chromosomal testers, you can also join if you have completed an autosomal test. Additionally, even if you have tested on ancestry or 23andme, you can transfer the test results to family tree at no cost. The current volunteer admin team is comprised of myself, Beth McPherson Frost (Admin from United States) and John Harper (Co-admin from Australia).

Just a few basics on DNA testing for genealogical purposes. There are 3 main types of tests, autosomal DNA tests which are offered through most companies, y-DNA tests which are only offered via family tree DNA and m-DNA tests. Each of the tests have some advantages and draw backs. Autosomal DNA testing can be completed by either females or males. This type of test covers all your family lines. The main draw back to this test is that it starts to miss cousin matches at around the 3-4th range. This is due to the fact that by this point, you start sharing very little DNA with each other, so deep ancestry can be difficult to determine or confirm.

YDNA focuses specifically on a male line. The Y chromosome changes very little from generation to generation, so as a male, if you are a Mc/Macpherson, you are testing only this line. The clear disadvantage for this testing is it is only available for males and must be your father's line you are researching. The advantage is that you can go much deeper in your research and draw connections to sixth, seventh etc. cousins where your autosomal DNA will likely not pick this up.

The third type is M-DNA – this is available to both males and females and covers your mother's mother's line. The tricky part about this type of DNA is you can not connect it to a specific family line considering your surname typically changes every generation on your maternal side.

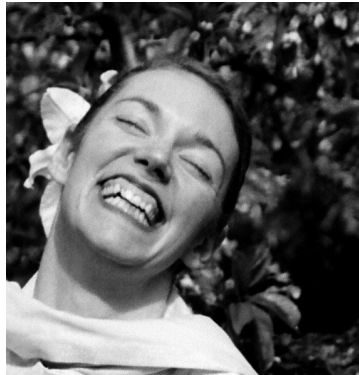

Shawna Kathleen Biamonte passed away from us on Sunday January 30, 2022, surrounded by the love of her mother Margaret, sister Christina, and Chris, her lover, soulmate and husband.

Born in 1975, Shawna was Margaret's first child. She grew up in Edmonton, which was always home to her, no matter where she lived or travelled. As a child she was always smiling and easy going, with an occasional stubborn streak. [The day she ran away from her mom at Sears and was found calmly watching TV was an early sign of her independent nature.]

Margaret, Christina, Chris, and Shawna road-tripped all-over Western Canada and the US together, visiting family in the Okanagan and Vancouver Island, and bringing home delicious fresh fruit and wine.

Shawna had many passions, including cooking, wine, learning, music, travel, art, fashion, and architecture. She lived those passions in her work and volunteering, becoming a radio DJ at CJSR with her own show 'Magpie Music'; acting as a Canadian Folk Music Awards juror; new music reviewer for 'Penguin Eggs' magazine; and volunteering at the Calgary Folk Music Festival.

She and Chris loved to travel together, with New York and London becoming two of their favourite destinations. At home they hiked, climbed, did yoga, enjoyed time with family and friends and made delicious vegetarian food together.

Shawna studied Geology at the U of A for three years, before finding her career path as a Registered Massage Therapist, which she practiced for 18 years in Edmonton and Calgary. In 2016 she returned to academic learning at University of Alberta to pursue a degree in Chemistry with a minor in Biology. Her tenacity led to achieving the distinctions of the honour society and the Dean's list.

She was a voracious reader and lover of the Edmonton Public Library. She had an unquenchable thirst for knowledge, and this informed her attitude to her cancer diagnosis in 2012. She met this challenge with all her wits, and a pragmatic, optimistic outlook.

Shawna's cheerful, infectious laugh, her intense interest in those she loved, her love of company while sharing good food and wine, and her incisive wit all made for memorable gatherings and adventures with friends and family.

MacPherson, John Alexander, of Halifax and formerly of Antigonish passed away on September 19, 2017, in Parkland at the Gardens, Halifax.

John Alexander MacPherson was born in Windsor, Ontario, June 1, 1931, the eldest son of Hugh L. MacPherson and Lenore Pratt. His father was a columnist and literary editor at the Windsor Star, a native of Cloverville, Antigonish County, and a graduate of St. Francis Xavier University. His great uncle was the Rev. Dr. H.A. MacPherson, President of St. Francis Xavier University from 1906 to 1936.

On his mother's side, John was an 8th generation Canadian, descended from Jean Duprat who arrived in Canada in the late 1600's settling in Trois Rivieres, Quebec. A grandson, Francois Prat made his way to the area of Windsor, Ontario in the mid 1700's and was among the first families to settle in that region.

John obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Western Ontario (1953), a Master of Arts from the University of Windsor (1955) and a Doctorate in Philosophy in English cum laude from the University of Ottawa (1967). John began his teaching career at Xavier College, Sydney (1955-61), and then enjoyed a long association with St. Francis Xavier University as an Associate Professor (1961), and then as a full Professor in the Department of English (1968) until his retirement in 1995. He specialized in Shakespeare and Renaissance literature.

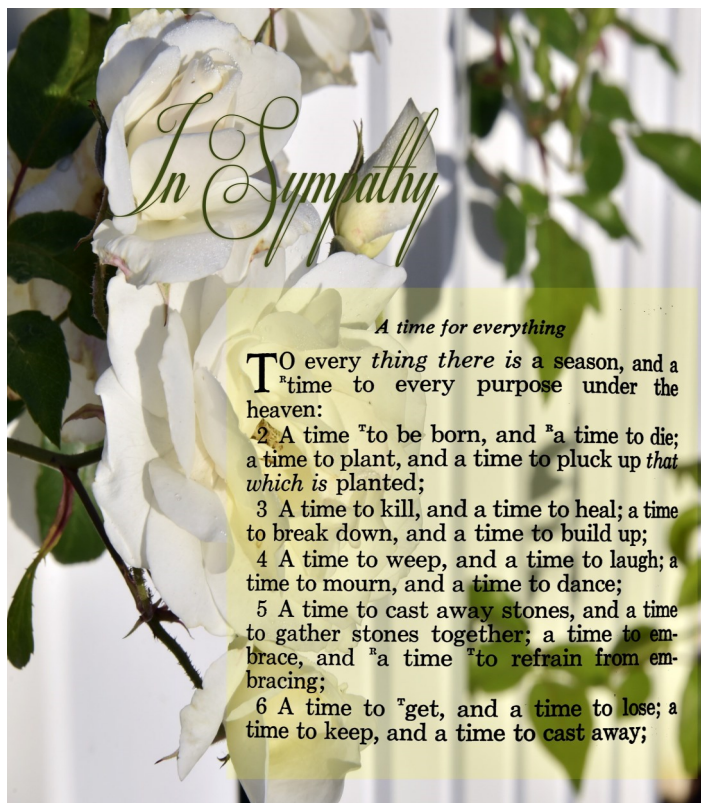
John served as University Ceremonial Officer from 1965 until 1995 and was instrumental in establishing a more formal ceremony for the feast day of St Francis Xavier and the formalization of the X-Ring ceremony. He received an honorary X-Ring, voted on by students, in 1994.

As a long time, Faculty Advisor to the StFX Student Council, John acted as a mentor to many students. Several of them became lifelong friends whose messages and visits he appreciated, particularly as his health declined in later years. Outside of the University, he took a very active part in civic and cultural affairs, notably with the Dominion Drama Festival, the Canadian Red Cross, Nova Scotia Division, and World University Service, to mention only a very few. He had a particular interest in gerontology - writing, lecturing and contributing volunteer services to many charitable organizations devoted to this discipline.

A devoted Roman Catholic, John was admitted to the Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of Malta as a Knight of Magistral Grace in October 1973, becoming a Knight of Grace and Devotion in 1976 and a Knight in Obedience in 1982. He became a Novice Knight of Justice in 1992 and professed his simple vows in 1993. John became a professed Knight of solemn vows in 1996 and was promoted to the rank of Grand Cross of Justice in 2001. In June 2004, he was promoted a Bailiff Grand Cross of Justice and, in 2009, he was awarded the Order's Grand Cross Pro Pio Melitensi.

John was elected President of the Canadian Association of the Order of Malta in 1988 and served until 1992. During that year, he hosted the visit to Canada of H.M.E.H. Fra' Andrew Bertie, 78th Prince and Grand Master of the Order, along with his retinue. From 1994 to 2009, he was a member of the Sovereign Council, the governing body of the Order, and from 2001 to 2010, he was President of the Committee for the protection of names and emblems of the Sovereign Order of Malta.

During his long and distinguished service to the Church and to the Order, John was awarded several high distinctions, chief of which were Gentleman of His Holiness (1991), Grand Officer of the papal Order of Saint Gregory the Great, and a Cross of the Order of the Holy Sepulchre which had awarded him its Cross of Merit. He was also a Grand Officer of the Order of Merit of Italy and a Grand Officer of the Order of Civil Merit of Spain. He served on the Supreme Council of the Sacred and Military Constantinian Order of St. George. John retired to Halifax where he died on September 19, 2017. He is survived by his brother, Neil MacPherson of Montreal, his sister Helen (Gordon) Wainman of London, Ontario and a niece Megan (Kerry Ambrose) Wainman of Toronto. He was predeceased by his parents and a sister, Dorothy MacPherson.
