





Ontario East and Quebec Report by Chantal McPherson







Please join our 'Gathering Stories - Recollections of a Clan'

The Clan Macpherson Museum invites you to a digital round-table on Zoom on Sunday 23rd October at 7pm (UK time), where members of the clan from all over the world will discuss the meaning of clanship and their sense of belonging with you.

The story of the Clan Macpherson is a story of land and landscape, family and belonging, loyalty and rebellion. It takes place across the world, from the clan homeland in Badenoch, across the Highlands and British Isles to the former British Empire and beyond to a global diaspora.

Members of the clan, who are brought together as a diverse, worldwide family of Macphersons, will share their stories and personal accounts, to offer exceptional glimpses into past gatherings and further the understanding of 'dùthchas', a Gaelic term that refers to the deep-rooted connection between a land and its people.

The result will be a conversation of great emotion that captures the importance of place and the resilience of culture through the spoken word and memories.

This event is part of a project that aims at recording clan heritage and culture in a series of personal interviews and has been funded through MGS (Museums and Galleries Scotland) as part of Scotland's Year of Stories 2022.


