


Ontario East and Quebec Report by Chantal McPherson

On January 14, a small number of Clan Macpherson members met at the Spadina Museum. In 1866, the property on which the Museum now sits, was purchased by businessman and financier, James Austin, founder of the Dominion Bank and president of Consumers Gas. Derived from the Ojibwa word "ishpandinaa" meaning "to go uphill" "Spadina" was the name chosen for the property that sat at the top of the escarpment. The Austin's and their children used their 80 acres for farming until James, and later his son Albert, subdivided and sold most of the land. The remaining 5.7 acres include an orchard, a grape arbour and a kitchen garden.

Normally Spadina Museum provides a glimpse into the life of this affluent family of Irish ancestry. It offers a look back at the history of Toronto and what it might have been like to live and work in Toronto at this amazing time of historical and cultural transformation. The art, décor and architecture of the house reflect the styles of the times, including Victorian, Edwardian, Art Nouveau and Colonial Revival styles.

However, currently the museum has been reimagined for the immersive Dis/Mantle art exhibit. The Dis/Mantle art exhibit was inspired by the efforts of Black abolitionists, and transforms Spadina Museum into Mrs. Pipkin's* Manor, a remarkable woman from Maryland, USA, who escaped slavery and later worked as the laundress for the Austin family. Utilizing an Afrofuturistic narrative, this work depicts Mrs. Pipkin as the homeowner, reimagining the house as a haven for those who travelled safely to southern Ontario via the Underground Railroad.

The multi-sensory installation includes soundscapes, ceramics and visual art by Canadian artists from the Afro Caribbean diaspora, most notably from Gordon Shadrach, who's work features local and notable figures in the Black community who have shown leadership and who contributed to art, sports, commerce and culture, including Toronto Raptors players.

Throughout the tour, our guide provided immense insights into slavery, those escaping from slavery, and the heart-wrenching stories shared by those trying to find their family or bring their family north to the relative safety of Canada. When the British Imperial Act of 1833 was passed in Britain, it ended the enslavement of Africans in the British Empire, which included Canada. Effective August 1st, 1834, it was the first global human rights legislation impacting the situation of Africans and other enslaved peoples.

No matter where it was celebrated, Burns night always offers a wonderful opportunity to toast Scotland's Bard with a wee dram or two, enjoy the sound of the pipes and indulge in some Haggis, Neeps and Tatties.

Now that January is behind us and we are starting to experience some warmer weather, I'm sure many of us are starting to turn out minds to this summer's Highland Games.

News reached me this week that my local Highland Games, located in Kingsville, Ontario on the shores of Lake Erie, was being threatened with cancellation. The Games launched in 2019 and allegedly welcomed over 6000 visitors that year. The games were regarded as a major success and resulted in revenues being generated for the town.

Then the COVID pandemic hit and the games were cancelled for several years. The town returned to hosting the games last year in 2022. Unfortunately, the Pandemic took its toll on ticket sales and the Games were said to have lost over \$18,000. Although some of this was covered from reserves from the prior games, a net loss of a little over \$6,000 was still reported. For a small town (or really any community), this is extremely significant. As a result, the town decided to discontinue the event and it's very existence was questioned. Luckily, a decision was made by the Jack Miner Sanctuary located just outside Kingsville to give the Games another chance.

This truly brings to light the need for us as a Clan to support our Highland events if we wish to see them continued. Clearly, no event could justify existence if reporting net losses of over \$18,000 . I am also aware that Caledonia Highland Games made the difficult decision to discontinue after the pandemic. This summer, why not try taking in a Games, especially if you haven't been to one before. I can assure you that you will not be disappointed and your attendance may help the smaller games such as Kingsville continue for years to come!

For those interested, especially those residing in Southwestern Ontario, the Kingsville Games will take place on June 24th, 2023 at Jack Miner Bird Sanctuary located at 332 Rd 3 W, Kingsville, Ontario.

Who knows, perhaps I will see some of you there!

The clan association is in good shape financially as we begin the new year.


We have \$9,246 in our current account and \$11,631.00 in our Life Membership Fund. We are showing a gain of \$391.00 year to date in the current account.

Robert William Archibald

In his 88th year Robert passed peacefully on December 22, 2022. Survived by his beloved wife of 65 years, Sondra (nee Ewart), children Laurel (John Craig), Shelley (Hugh Brown), and Duncan (Lisa Davies). Loved by his grandchildren Melanie and Jack Brown, Sam and Katherine Hall, and Ellen and David Archibald. Also survived by sister Marian Badgery (Alan) of Aurora and brother-in-law David Ewart (Vivian) of Calgary. Predeceased by his sisters Dorothy Hesser, Joan Reed, and brothers John and Frederick.

Bob was born April 6, 1935, in Oshawa, the fifth child of Arthur and Jean Archibald of Whitby, Ontario. He studied engineering at Queen's University and earned a Master of Business Administration at McMaster University in Hamilton where Bob and Sondra raised their family. He returned to full-time studies in Business Administration at the University of Western Ontario, completing his doctorate in 1976. He began his career in civil engineering at Archibald Gray & McKay in London, then spent six years in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick with National Parks of Canada. Returning to Ontario, he worked in the cement industry. However, his true vocation was teaching, and he held various positions including time in Dar es Salaam, the University of Guelph, and finally at Lakehead University.

In 2000, he retired to Brantford spending his time vigorously supporting the community, volunteering at the Brantford Hospital, the Brantford Club and the Board of Enterprise Brant. He was a member of Probus Club of Brantford and Brant Valley Engineers. Bob and Sondra loved to travel and especially enjoyed their visits to Scotland, the home of his ancestors, as members of the Clan Macpherson Association.



LCol Mark Francis Macpherson, CD, GCLJ, GOMLJ, MBA, BComm, BSc(EE), Ing. FSAScot

April 1, 1932 - January 14, 2023

Mark Francis Macpherson passed away peacefully in his sleep at the age of 90 at the Jewish General Hospital in Montreal after a lengthy battle with a blood infection. He is survived by his wife of 67 years, June Macpherson, and sons Robert, Ian, and Myles, and 5 grandchildren, brother to Rod Macpherson and Margot Whitford. He was born in St Thomas, Ontario to father Robert, and mother Maxine Macpherson, but was raised in Winnipeg, MB, where he met June. He graduated in 1956 with a degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Manitoba which complemented a lifelong passion for amateur radio and telecommunications. He was a life member of Radio Amateurs of Canada starting in 1979 and also a life member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

After moving to Montreal in 1956, he worked in radio, and later the new field of television with the CBC. Subsequently, he joined RCA and worked in aerospace on satellites and ground tracking stations. Identified as a key management employee at RCA, he was selected for the prestigious Robert A. Sarnoff fellowship and earned a MBA degree in 1971 from Sir George Williams University (now Concordia U). He then joined Esso, Building Products Division in LaSalle, Quebec where he rose to become the VP and General Manager of the division. He continued his career working in his own company selling telecommunications products where he travelled worldwide visiting numerous countries across the globe. Prior to his final retirement, he relocated to Hemmingford, Quebec in 1988, where he served on the board of the Hemmingford Golf Club, started the Covey Hill Amateur Radio Club, and also served a term as a Municipal Counsellor, Township of Hemmingford, QC.

Mark also had a full military career starting as a Signaller in the RCME in Manitoba in 1950 during the Korean conflict. He was commissioned in 1952. When his work took him to Montreal, he wanted to be part of an elite unit, and so joined the Canadian Grenadier Guards in 1957 and was appointed the Lieutenant Colonel Commanding from 1965-1968. He continued his association with the regiment from 1968 onwards as a member of the Canadian Grenadier Guards council, was the Honorary Lieutenant Colonel from 1985-1991, and President of both the Guards Club and the Association at various times.

Mark was always noted for his service before self through his passions and many volunteer engagements. He had a long association with the Corps of Commissionaires as a Governor of the Quebec Division, from 1987 onwards and was recognized as one of its longest serving members. He was the First Vice President of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 244 Hemmingford from 1999-2017. In addition, he held the rank of Captain-Lieutenant in the 78th Fraser Highlanders from 2000. He was a Sustaining Member - and former Prior, of the Grand Priory in Canada; former Commander Montreal Commandery: Military and Hospitaller Order of Saint Lazarus of Jerusalem, from 1998 until his passing. His passion for the outdoors and teaching young people led him to start the Cote St Luc Wolf Cub Pack, Scouts Canada in 1965. This in turn steered the family to many canoe and camping trips in various parks and wilderness areas in eastern Canada and the USA, teaching his sons about the outdoors in both summer and winter.

Mark was intrigued with his family history and ancestry, and was a life member of the Clan Macpherson Association - Canada Branch, and served as its President for many years and represented Canada with many trips to Scotland. He also did much research into his family lineage which led him in 1999 to becoming a life member of the Royal Heraldry Society of Canada and the President of its Laurentian Branch in 2004.

On a personal level, he was always known as a staunch family man with unassailable integrity, high intelligence and perseverance. He was respected by friends, co-workers, and all who associated with him in both military and civilian life. He was known as trustworthy and impeccably fair to all, no matter their station in life.
