

Gordon's Sword

My Grandson, Dominik, and I took a drive to the Borden Military Museum this summer to find out more about Gordon's Sword, kindly donated by Sandy Macpherson and Kirk and Pam McPherson. Jake took a look at Gordon's sword and wrote up this information about it.

Hello,

Thanks for coming in yesterday with your sabre. I did a bit of looking and I would agree that it is German. The blade marking is associated with Weyersberg Kirschbaum & co in Solingen. The particular mark with the two heads and the W.K.S initials (two companies merged and combined their marks) would likely date this sword to the 1880s or later. Being post 1871, it would be a German rather than Prussian weapon, though the company dates much further back. They produced a wide range of swords, knives, cutlery, bicycle parts and later car parts and exported them around the world. They were a major supplier of bayonets, and swords to the German military as well as some foreign forces.

Many officers would have purchased their swords privately and would have not been part of official issue, or on the other hand a military may purchase a number of swords like these and officially issue them, though they are not necessarily a design specific to that force. Therefore, its hard to place this sword with any particular military etc.

At this time, most officers would have had a sword for ceremonial purposes, which makes sense given the decorations on the blade. Most NCMs swords or those issued for combat would have been simpler. That being said, many officers did carry their swords on active service as a rank indicator. These swords were made with the blades dull and were usually kept that way. It looks like your sword has never been sharpened, at least for most of the blade. If you look at the line of the edge from the ricaso to the strong of the blade, it is strait and aligned. If it had been sharpened and dulled later, I would expect some sort of dip where the material was ground away. Additionally, the etchings are located so close to the edge that any significant sharpening would have erased some of them. Near the foible (tip of the blade) it is a bit sharper and its possible that this area was sharpened though I would say its not likely. However, it does have a number punched into the sword and scabbard, indicating that it was officially issued or accounted for, likely military.

In conclusion, I would say that this is a German ceremonial Officers sword from the late 19th or early 20th C. Overall its in fantastic condition and worth looking after and keeping in the collection. It would (if possible) be worth asking where Gordon Macpherson obtained the sword, that may be a good starting point to figure out exactly who owned it or where it may have been used.

However, this is not at all my area of expertise and a dedicated sword expert would possibly be able to tell you more.


