Over the ensuing years, he's made many close friends, brothers and sisters in the Clan, and has attended the Gathering in Scotland at least 7 times. In 2012, he gave the words to his poem, "Of Singing Swords In The Highlands" to Dee McPherson, who wrote the music for it. This song appears on her third CD "Love Songs For A Scot." Together, they sang this song at the 2013 Ceilidh.

He has served our US Branch as Pacific Central Region Commissioner and has attended countless US Branch Highland Games Events, and many of the US AGMs. He's also been known to ride his Harley wearing his kilt.

In his own words in closing, "over the last 10 years I've shared hundreds of events with close friends: Scottish games, AGMS, fantastic trips to Scotland. I love you all and thank you for making my experience with Clan Macpherson one of the most special parts of my life."

His mother Louise Gilliss (1913-2002) had traced the family heritage back a couple hundred years. The Gilliss relatives include names like Hall, Ricketts, Perkins, Ian, Murdoch, and MacPherson.
